BRITAIN AND RUSSIA.

Another step in the direction of insuring the maintenance of European ce was made on Saturday, when a vention between Great Britain and ssia was formally signed. Though yet the text of the treaty has not made public, there is every reato believe that it covers and regutes the respective interests of the no powers in Afghanistan, Thibet and Persia, and removes any possible danthere may have been of a Russian invasion of India. Though for many years the need and desirability of such a treaty has been admitted, there have been obstacles in the way that seemed insuperable. The two nations have been regarded as traditional enemies with radical differences, and there have been powerful influences in Great Britain vigorously opposed to any friendly understanding with Russia because of general political incompatability. For a free and democratic country to lend aid or prestige to a tyrannical and fanatical autocracy, it was contended, was simply outrageous. Indeed, it is not many weeks since a strong protest of this character was presented to the British Government. But the influence of King Edward, who, no doubt, has been largely instrumental in bringing about this treaty, as he has those with other nations, seems to have overcome all obstacles, and the Anglo-Russia convention is now an accomplished fact.

The treaty is not only a peace instrument, but it makes for civilization and progress, and it is to the credit of the Russian Liberals and Radicals that the convention has their support, for they realize that a liberalizing influence on Muscovite bureaucrats must result from improved relations with a constitutional and democratic country such as Great Britain.

It is not improbable that the Anglo-Japanese alliance has had something to do with inducing Russia to enter into treaty relations with Great Britain, for so long as that alliance extempt the folly of an invasion of India. Besides, in her present crippled condition as a result of her war with Japan, Russia just now is in no position to court foreign trouble or to plan military adventures and invasions. Nevertheless the treaty is a substantial and gratifying addition to the guarantees of peaceful development and to the maintenance of the status quo in Europe and the European spheres of influence. It is also a triumph for diplomacy far more substantial in its effects than all the achievements thus far of the peace conference at The Hague.
