

FRENCH-CANADIAN MEMBERS BLAMED BY BOURASSA FOR THE SITUATION IN QUEBEC

Montreal, June 21. Denouncing those French-Canadian members of Parliament who had fooled the English in the dominion as to the attitude of the English people towards the issue of Bourassa again dealt with the conscription issue and its cause in a speech at the University of Ottawa.

Mr. Bourassa said the French-Canadian people did not want conscription, ways that, their compatriots were ready to die for England, the same as the English people were ready to die for Canada.

Continuing, Mr. Bourassa says: "It was a lack of loyalty towards the King and a lack of loyalty towards the British Empire, for our deputies to fool them into believing that the English people thought in English that we loved in English, that we rejoice in English; that we were proud of English; that we were the truth, how many of you were in England? How many of you were in many of you here? And all your deputies at Ottawa, Liberal and Conservative, were ready to go to the gallows, why wonder that in the English provinces they wonder how you are cowards?"

When time showed them that they were lies, what was the feeling? Instead of being proud of English, they had mutual respect, instead of discussing with the English why we do not think in the same way as they do.

Mr. Bourassa said that the English come? The men at Ottawa were simply liars, or we were cowards."

Mr. Bourassa said the French-Canadians had a right to know where Laurier was in the future conscription. "What will the old man say about conscription? Will he defend himself, or in a matter so vital to the future of the country, will he say 'this province'?" he demanded. So far Wilfrid had only declared against conscription, but he had not said for or against.

Refer to Deserter.

Mr. Bourassa moved a resolution that conscription was being introduced to form a police for the United States, so as to prevent the desertion of Canadian soldiers. Perhaps one of the reasons why Ontario was so opposed to conscription was that it was to draw the noise and the loud steps of thousands of Canadians who were deserting to the United States.

The Nationalist's leader told of a Toronto man who had come to his office, and said: "I am a deserter from the army. We should have stopped this enlisting of men, and we should have stopped this war." He was on a manifesto calling the Rowell-Clarke pro-conscription meeting in Toronto.

In conclusion, Mr. Bourassa said: "If you do not see the truth of what I have said, then say at Ottawa the next time we have done enough for the war, and then say 'this province'."

Copenhagen, June 22.—Assumption that the "survey of Austrian public opinion on war aims," circulated by the Austrian Correspondence Bureau, represented the Austro-Hungarian Government's program of peace terms, is confirmed by an article in the *Lemberg Herald*, published under the title, "The official Government program." The article, for which high authority is claimed, says that Serbia and Montenegro must be "incorporated" into the development in close economic association with Austria-Hungary. In other words it proposes a customs union. It declares that Loeven Mountain, in Montenegro, must be retained as the key of the Balkan entrance, that must be given autonomy under military and economic suzerainty of Austria-Hungary. Vancouver, June 22.—After eight days' strike by employees of the British Columbia Electric Railway, streetcars were running today in Vancouver, Victoria and other lines in this district. Rome, June 21.—Successes for the Italians in both the Dolomites region and on the Carso Plateau are reported in an official statement issued by the Italian war office tonight. The text of the statement follows:

"Yesterday evening in the Val Castanea-Ampezzo sector we exploded a powerful mine, which had been prepared for some time, and the operation worked, under the spur of the Lagazuolo Piccolo. The explosion blew up the position and destroyed the garrison. Our Alpine troops, following close on the explosion and supported by artillery, boldly carried the summit of Hill 2648 on Lagazuolo Piccolo and distinguished themselves gloriously there."

Washington, June 22.—Many hundreds of thousands of Russian prisoners in Germany already have died, and more are dying from famine and tuberculosis, according to a letter sent today by Messrs. Borodine and Sakhnovsky of the Russian mission to the Red Cross war committee in London. The letter says that one-half a pound of bread per day, and besides this a very small quantity of unwholesome potatoes and the worst kind of coffee," the letter said. The Red Cross is asked by the commission to do everything possible to send to Copenhagen the most food from a quantity of bread sufficient at least for the first month," while Russian organizations are preparing to meet the difficulty. For the two million Russian prisoners the need is estimated to be 30,000,000 pounds of food, or about \$2,400,000. About \$10,000 previously raised in this country has now all been expended, the letter says.
