HUBERT JOHNSTON, FORMERLY OF CITY, IS DEAD IN CHICAGO

Well-Known Writer and Advertising Man.

SOLDIERS AT SANATORIUM DESIRE RETENTION OF DR. BELL; RESENT INTIMATION GIVEN OF CHANGE

Are Incensed by the Remarks Made by Sir Adam Beck, and Ask G. W. V. A. For Support.—Matron Reported To Have Resigned.

Intimation by Sir Adam Beck, head of the London Health Association, that the Alexandra Sanatorium will bring an order from the court to discontinue treatment at the institution that Dr. Bell is being given, has caused the soldiers at the sanatorium to be incensed. They will ask the Great War Veterans to take the matter into consideration and to support the claims of a number of the soldiers at the sanatorium. The invalided soldiers that Dr. Bell has been supplanted because of the fair treatment he has meted out to the men.

Recent Accusation. Sir Adam Beck's intimation bringing to the Sanatorium a physician who has served overseas. He made this statement at the recent meeting of the association when he ascribed the complaints of the men regarding better food to the fact that they were not well and naturally inclined to find fault.

The men resent the statement that they are "grumblers." They realize that there may be one or two incurable kickers at the Sanatorium but they do not like to be described as a unit of disgruntled and fault-finding patients. They are giving credit where credit is due, but they do not propose to be misrepresented.

Have Faith in Dr. Bell. They believe that Dr. Bell has given the institution the best kind of service, and that he is well qualified as a specialist on tuberculosis, having devoted most of his life to the cure of this disease. And while, naturally, they favor the placing of returned soldiers in all available positions, they do not believe a well-qualified man should be dismissed.

It was stated today that the matron of the civilian department at the Sanatorium has resigned in her resignation letter she was informed by an orderly that he was no longer under her jurisdiction, and that he was to carry a tray to one of the sheds.
