IN THE CAUSE OF FLOWERS.

Concluding Proceedings of the Horticultural Society. The Ontario Horticultural Association concluded its conventions yesterday.

The directors' report recommended that the department of agriculture increase the legislative grant at least \$2000, as the membership of the societies had increased over one-third during the year. A tax on billboards was also recommended.

It was also decided to affiliate with the American Civic Improvement Association, and J. Lockie Wilson, Prof. Hutt will be delegates to the annual meeting next week.

Rev. A. H. Scott, Perth, read the report, the committee appointed to consider the incorporation of horticultural topics in the new school books of the province, which strongly urged that such be done. The department of education, while recognizing the importance of this, stated that these books would be ready only, while they would bring nature study as much as possible to the front, they could not teach special subjects.

Rev. A. H. Scott, Perth, reported a balance on hand of \$96.30. Twenty-eight societies had paid affiliation fees for the next year.

The election of officers resulted: President, Major H. J. Shelgrove, Cobourg (re-elected); first vice-president, R. B. Whyte, Ottawa (re-elected); second vice-president, Roderick Cameron, Toronto (re-elected); secretary, J. Lockie Wilson, Toronto; treasurer, H. E. Cowan, Peterboro; hon. directors, W. Diamond (Belleville), Miss Blacklock, Hutt (O.A.C., Guelph), Prof. W. T. Macoun (C.E.F., Ottawa); directors, James Mitchell (Goderich), G.W. Tebb (Hespeler), John S. Pearce (London).

SOME CAN VOTE THREE TIMES

BUDAPEST, Nov. 11.—The bill providing for universal suffrage in Hungary was presented to the chamber of deputies to-day by Count Andrási, minister of the interior. It contains many novel provisions that are designed, as the preamble points out, to prevent the political class from voting wholly into the hands of illiterates or those not in a position to use the franchise.

The bill provides that every Hungarian over 24 years of age who has resided in the country for one year is entitled to vote. Illiterates, however, will be assembled in groups of ten, and each group will have the power to select a single elector.

As a further means of "preserving the ascendancy of the intelligent classes" the bill provides for a system of plural electors for every 32 years of age who have fulfilled their military duty and who have three children are given two votes. Workmen who have completed a course of the secondary schools, also are given a double vote.

Electors who have completed the full course of the secondary schools or who pay \$30 in direct annual taxes, are to have the high privilege of voting three times.

CHINA WILL FIGHT JAPAN.

Missionary Says That Revolution is Also in Formation. PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 11.—Declaring that the youth of China, the younger and more progressive element in the nation, would overthrow the present dynasty, Rev. William Christie, a missionary at the Christian and Missionary Society, said that the disturbances were about due in the celestial empire, and also that a war with Japan was in contemplation.

The object of the revolutionary movement is the overthrow of the present dynasty, which is hated for its conservatism and feared for its power. During the past year there have been three or four attempts, each time before the movement had been fully organized. "China is not afraid of Japan. The government is afraid of the people. The training of men for the war with the Japanese, that eventually will come. All this talk of revolution, of China and of the western nations is ridiculous."

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Hotelkeeper Sent to Jail for Three Months for Selling Hoax.
