> OTTAWA, April 25.—The annual re-port of the militia council, presented to the house of commons to-day, shows that last year out of a total establis ment of 43,742, 36,224 underwent annual training, of whom 12,100 were in the district camps, 7469 at regimental camps, and 16,565 at local headquar-

ters.
The report of Sir Percy Lake, the inspector-general, states that "the efficiency of the whole force suffered severely from the decrease in the votes upon which it depended for maintenance and drill." In the permanent force establishments had been reduced below the limit of efficiency and recruiting had been stopped.


