BALL TEAMS ARRANGE THEIR TRAINING TOURS

First Sign That the Season is Ahead—Baseball Notes and Gossip.

The Chicago Nationals will train at Tampa, Fla., carrying out the plan made by Manager Brannan and President Thomas before the sale of the team to Charles H. Weeghman. Four games will be played there by the Cubs and the Philadelphia Nationals, March 15-22. On April 1 and the Cubs and the New Orleans team will play at New Orleans, and on the same dates the Cubs' second team and the Reds will play at Shreveport, La.

Wounded Soldiers Watch League Games Of Baseball in Paris

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Ralph Conte, a Cuban journalist, who dabbles in baseball in his spare moments, has returned from the seat of war in Europe, and tells of the great enthusiasm for the American game made in France. At the present time there is a three-day league in Paris which plays on Saturdays, and always attracts a big crowd of spectators.

The pitiful part of it all is, according to Conte, that the majority of the crowd is made up of men who have been wounded in battle.

Soldiers who are not so badly damaged and cheer a clean-up wallop or howl derisively at a bad error after the fashion of the American fans.

"The French people," said Conte yesterday, "are taking baseball with even greater enthusiasm than we Cubans embraced it. Were it not for the war, I have no doubt that they would have formed a national league, just as the Americans have. There are plenty of real baseball players over there, but they are weak with the bat when facing any kind of pitching. Fortunately there are a few good pitchers, and the scores often mount into double figures. I have seen a few games over there where the scores were 10 to 9, but for the most part they are 15 to 12 and thereabouts."

A few Americans and some Cuban boys started playing after the trip of the White Sox and Giants to France two years ago and the sport found a home in deep mourning for those who are dead on the field of honor attend the games to get away from the dismal surroundings."
