WESTERN WAR CENSUS.

As a basis for urging the men of Winnipeg to raily to the colors, a voluntary committee made a canvass of the city, and as a result they state that there are only 4500 single men and widowers without children between the ages of 18 and 45 years in Winnipeg who are eligible as recruits, according to the military registration census, which has just been completed. Of the total, 1583 are of Canadian and 1846 of British birth, 204 of American, 266 of allies, and 585 of enemy nations.



CESSATION OF IMPORTS RAISES COST OF ONIONS


