If those so-called 'reds' and 'communists' desiring a working class government devoted their energy to creating a desire for that class of government among the majority of the working class electors of this country instead of meeting like Russian nishlists in secret in some obscure back room and shouting among themselves for a red revolution, they would be showing more sincerity for the cause of the working people, he said.

Those who shouted the loudest for revolution were found to be the shirkers at the ballot. In a country like Canada, where the rights of the workers are always possible of accomplishment thru the franchise, all talk of bringing about a working class utopla by force of arms was both idle and unscientific.

As no government, capitalistic or otherwise, could live without the citizens having the right of free speech, free assemblage and universal franchise, the working class now held the key to the power of government. The majority of that class beyond all doubt at the present time preferred the present form of government and until the desire of the majority had been created for a change there would be no change. To talk of revolution bringing about a change was foolish.

foolish.

It was the desire of the trade union movement to bring about a desire for a working-class government among the electors, and thru the Independent Labor Party and kindred organizations. Once the desire was created, the men to carry on that government would be supplied.

# **BIG LIQUOR THEFT** IN RAILWAY DEPOT

From Baggage Room in Bridgeburg.
