THE LONDONS GRAB OFF TWO ONE CLOSE THE OTHER A ROMP

In Fast Seven-Inning Exhibition Game McClary's Lose to Pros
Three to Two, While Guelph International Team
Is Completely Swamped.

The opening exhibition games of the season at Tecumseh Park were productive of every kind of baseball on the map. There was fair ball, passable ball, and the punkest kind of ball, and despite the fact that the Londons proved victors in both games, the host of fans present left with a bad taste in their mouths.
In fairness to Manager Wreath, however, it can be stated that he was in no wise responsible for that state of affairs. As much cannot be said for Manager Murray, of Guelph, for if there is a pickup team in a local corner lot that cannot trim the aggregation of alleged ballplayers that he induced on the local public it ought to get off the earth and stay there. It was stated after the game that the Guelph team was a City League aggregation, that was being tried out in response to a demand from the Guelph fans that "home talent" be given a chance. If that be true, then all that can be said is that Guelph and not London was the place to try out dubs at forty cents a throw.

London Has Good Material.
As for the Londons, they showed in both games that with few changes they have the making of a team several shades faster than the best that the London City League can put up.
Errors almost lost them the game to the McClarys, but clean hitting, coupled with a stolen base and a base on a pitched ball, enabled the wearers of the gray and brown to nose out the prizes of the tin factory by one run.

Gianelli Is Good.
To one Gianelli, club artist par excellence, however, must go the bulk of the credit for the victory, and had he received mid-season support there would have been nothing to it but a goose egg for the thimble. Without desiring to take away any of the credit for their fine showing, it must be said that the McClarys did not earn either of their two runs. Errors on the part of Nobes, "Nig" Jeffries and Dauber were wholly responsible for the tallies, the former being particularly off color. Possibly it was nervousness, perhaps it was because he felt Manager Wreath's eagle lamps upon him, possibly it was because he was more, but the fact remains that Nobes apparently couldn't have stopped a barrel had it been rolled down the first base line Saturday. It looks like Rochester and the City League for his.

"Ischy" Went Up.
For the Smiths "Ischy" Clarke did things up in nice style, but the pros got to him in the sixth and it was all off. Clarke held the coingrabsers down safely until that time, however, and it was bunting of his which broke up the combination.
There was nothing stirring on either side until the fourth when the Smiths copped off their only points. Nobes at first made two rank fumbles in that round, while "Nig" Jeffries played greasy fingers with one which landed square in his mitts out in left garden. "Tootle" purloined two bags, and Dauber helped things along by heaving heavenward while trying to cop a runner at first.

Bird Steals Second.
The pros were never dangerous until the sixth. Bird took one of Clarke's pro sliders in the region of the bread box, and stole second. "Nig" fanned. Shortman took a ride, and Bird scored on Dauber's hit. Gates bumped the pill on the nozzle, and in a throwing feast which followed, Shortman and Dauber went in Perch foul out and Gianelli was out from short to first. The Londons went down in three and four fashion up until that time, while the City Leaguers managed to get as far as third in the third on a wild throw.
Neither side got further than third after the sixth, and the game was called in the eighth in order to get through with the second affair in time for Guelph to catch a train.
