Steamer Wrecked.
San Francisco, Oct. 7.—The Merchants' Exchange has received a cable despatch from London, stating that the steel steamer Minnesota, of 1,825 tons, bound from Petrograd, Siberia, for this port, struck a reef off the West End on Sept. 5 and became a total wreck. The officers and crew were rescued and taken to Hakodate, Japan, by the British warship Albatross.
