

Moved by the Hon. Mr. Justice Parker, seconded by Lieutenant-S. Huggins—

The meeting was addressed by several individuals, whose remarks prove that the principles of this Society are calculated to put the axe at the root of the tree, and effectually to banish from the earth, that alarming form of mankind, INTemperance. The Abstinence Society is gradually increasing, but not so rapidly as we hope it soon will. The annual Meeting of this Society is to take place in August, of which public notice will be given.—Communicated.

CORONER'S INQUEST.—On Wednesday last, an Inquest was held on the body of Frances Townsend, a colored woman, who was found suspended by the neck in her bed-room, on the evening previous. From the evidence adduced, the Jury were quite satisfied that the poor woman was labouring under an aberration of mind, and without hesitation returned a verdict that the deceased "hung herself by a cord when in a fit of temporary insanity."—Gazette.

On Friday, an Inquest was held on view of the body of John, infant son of Mr. John Holmes, of the Royal Artillery, aged about two years, who was drowned the evening previous, by accidentally falling into a tank-vat, in the yard of Mr. B. Coxeter.—Verdict to that effect.

It is to be regretted that the proprietor of the tannery should have allowed the premises to remain open to the public, without at the same time covering the vats—the want of such care has deprived the parents of a very fine child.—Courier.

We have been favored with a copy of the subject of Despatch to His Excellency Sir John A. Macdonald, which, we have no doubt, will be highly gratifying to our readers and the Province at large.—

"Donning Street, 25th May, 1835.
"Sir, The Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations, having had under their consideration the duties at present levied in New-Brumswick, upon the importation of Flour and Provisions, expressed to my Predecessor their opinion that the abolition of those duties was called for by a due regard to the interests of that Province. In this opinion, both Lord Aberdeen and myself have concurred, and a clause will, therefore, be introduced into the Customs Amendment Bill of the present Session, extending to New-Brumswick the same freedom from duty with reference to those articles as is enjoyed by the Canadian Provinces; but in order to obviate any inconvenience which might otherwise arise, it is not intended that this provision should take effect until the 1st January, 1836.

A debate took place in the House of Lords on the 12th ult., in reference to the proceedings of the Home Government on Canadian affairs. The object of the discourse made by Lord Glenelg, and which were elicited by the enquiries of Lord Aberdeen, is that the gallant Lord Aylmer, who at present fills the high station of Governor of the Canadas, is to make place for the Earl of Gosford, who is to form one of a Board of Inquiry—consisting in all of three Commissioners—to investigate the grievances complained of by the Canadians.
We do not not to inquire whether this alteration in the plan formed by the Peel Administration—this substitution for the admitted loyalty, intelligence, and knowledge of circumstances, of Lord Amherst—will in the end conduce more to the interests of the Mother Country and her Colonies. We have, it is true, an opinion on this head, which, however, at present, it would be useless to express; but we cannot refrain from availing ourselves of the occasion, to direct the attention of our readers to the following well-merited obsequy, passed by a political opponent on Lord Glenelg—by the pen of a Scotchman, and published in the Morning Post, on the 10th inst. "The master and crew of the bark Orion, J. Card, master, from Whitehaven, for Quebec, was landed here from Cape Ray, (in another small vessel) which was wrecked about two miles from the other vessel; five of the crew of the Orion perished—most of the persons saved were in a very destitute state, having nothing but what they stood in—the only passenger saved of the 39, was a young woman, who miraculously held on to the rigging during the night, while all the others were washed overboard, with three of the crew—she much cut and bruised by the rocks, but will recover."
Extract of a Letter dated Sidney, July 22, 1835.
"The master, eight of the crew, and one passenger, belonging to the brig Nathaniel Graham, arrived here from Cape Ray, being the only survivors belonging to that vessel, which had on board 39 passengers, and a crew of 13 persons—41 in all perished shortly after the vessel struck near the Cape. It appears that some fatality is attending that place as well as Cape Ray, as on the 10th inst. the master and crew of the bark Orion, J. Card, master, from Whitehaven, for Quebec, was landed here from Cape Ray, (in another small vessel) which was wrecked about two miles from the other vessel; five of the crew of the Orion perished—most of the persons saved were in a very destitute state, having nothing but what they stood in—the only passenger saved of the 39, was a young woman, who miraculously held on to the rigging during the night, while all the others were washed overboard, with three of the crew—she much cut and bruised by the rocks, but will recover."

The Temperance Ship Prince Regent, from this port, with part of the 24th Regiment, arrived at Halifax on Monday the 27th ult.
Distressing Shipwreck.—The schr. Crescent, Joseph Roderick, of and for Albany, from Eastport, came in contact with brig Baltic, from New York for Bath, on Sunday 11th July, 15 miles E. of Black Island, and sunk in five minutes, carrying down Capt. R. S. Ruth Williams and two children, of Nova Scotia, and Mr. Joseph Wilson, passenger, and Robert Dickson and John Smith, seamen.
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THE LOWER CANADA LAND COMPANY.—We understand that the Agent of this Company has been forwarded from Quebec this Spring to the Eastern Townships, to settle upon the Company's Lands, a select hundred Emigrants, mostly practical farmers, and several of them with large pecuniary means. We continue unconceivably inactive in the settlement of the country, and reform in that respect essential. Strangers who visit Quebec after passing through the United States and the Upper Province speak of the prospects of the country as the most beautiful and rich of any they have seen; but they are surprised to be informed that it produces generally scarcely one tithe of what is practically produced in the vicinity of the town by an improved system of culture. If it were not for the fact that the country is so rich, it would multiply by ten our present resources.—Gazette.

LAND SPECULATIONS.—The mania in this way which has lately visited the Northern States, and particularly Maine, has extended to purchases of the territory on the proposed Railway to Portland, as well as to some parts of this Province. We learn that "two large sales of Lands in the neighbourhood of Lake Temiscouata have just taken place in Quebec; one of them for half a dollar an arpent for which something like £8000 was paid in cash. The objects seem to be to secure the timber, or speculate on a rise of prices.—Id.

Cardinal Benevolent Association.—We learn that an association of very respectable gentlemen in this city, has been recently organized for the purpose of concentrating and promoting Christian action in behalf of Canada. The President of the Association is the Hon. S. V. S. Wilder. The object is to co-operate with the Christian Church, and to aid them in sustaining the preaching of the Gospel, applying the doctrine to the Scriptures, establishing and sustaining Sunday Schools, distributing tracts and the like. We hope they may succeed in directing the attention and efforts of Christians to that long neglected field.—Id.
