Ottawa, May 9-It is now nearly six years since a commission, after visiting all the countries of Europe, made a report and recommendations on the question of technical education. The report mendations contemplated the appropria tion by the federal government of \$3,-000,000 per year for ten years for the development of an effective scheme in all the provinces of the dominion.
