
## Italy Likely Now To Send Troops To Balkans To Aid The Gallant Serbians

Bulgarian Threat to Invade Albania in Believe Balkans Most Important Order to Reach Adratic Believed to be Incentive—Serbian Situation Reported Satisfactory to Allies

Rome, Nov. 9-What appears to be a forecast that Italy will send troops to Albania to aid the Serbs is contained in a semi-official note which says that while Italy did not participate in the recent expe ition of the allies to assist Serbia, she has found a better way to oppose the Austro-German-Bulgarian attack on Serbia.

This way, the note says, was opened by the Bulgarians themselves when they threatened to invade Albania to reach the Adriatic, a design so dangerous to Italy's interest that the mere threat must oblige Italy to take appropriate measures to frustrate it immediately."
