Brooklyn Fans Are Confident

Experts Are Looking For The Team to Win National League Championship

In no city in the National League is there any more confidence in the ability of the home team to travel through the season to ultimate victory than in Brooklyn. The fans of Brooklyn feel positive that the flag will fly over Loew's in many seasons here and Manhattan. Not in many seasons have the Brooklyn fans been so hopeful of landing the bunting. If confidence is half the battle, as they say, the Superbas are on the road to the championship.

Last year this team was up in the race practically all of the season, but experts did not figure it highly and their opinion proved justified, as the Superbas fell in the final drive and caused little anxiety to the Phillies.

This year there is quite a reversal of feeling. The Superbas stood up well enough on their western trip to hold the lead, though not winning so many games as either the Giants or the Phillies.

The team is acknowledged to have the strongest pitching staff in the league, which is a most important item to start with. Chief Myers is catching up to the best form that he ever displayed when with the Giants; Jack Daubert is hitting them a mile, and the rest of the team is going at a fast clip. They have both offensive and defensive strength and are well fortified for all emergencies.

The team is playing more aggressive ball than it did last year. For several seasons the Brooklyn fans have had much latent strength, but it has never been brought out to its full extent. This year, however, Manager Robinson has installed more pep into the team and the club is actually fighting for games as it never did before. Many critics, mindful of past performance, and having little confidence in the playing powers and the battling qualities of the Superbas, have not counted them as serious factors. But in Brooklyn, such opinions are laughed at. From President Ebbets down to the last-boy there is a supreme belief that the team is going to come through at last. Brooklyn has not had the pennant since 1900, during the regime of Ned Hanlon. They think it about time for another one and this year they think they have the goods. So good a judge of baseball as John McGraw declared the other day that the Brooklyn club is the one he fears most heartily, and the one that will beat the Giants out, if any team does.

JOE WOOD REFUSES TO SIGN WITH RED SOX

Cleveland, July 29—Joe Wood has returned home to his farm without signing a contract with the Boston Red Sox. President Lanning agreed to pay Wood at the rate of \$12,000 a season for the balance of the year, this salary being what Wood's contract calls for, but refused negotiations with Wood for 1971, and it was this point that caused the split.

Before this morning's conference closed Wood offered President Lanning \$10,000 for his release.
