APPEAL TO ST. JOHN PEOPLE FOR SERBIANS

Knights of Columbus Take Up Matter in Their Behalf

A STRICKEN COUNTRY

Ravaged by Disease, Thousands and Thousands of Deaths, and Great Shortage of Surgical and Medical Supplies—How All Can Assist.

The Knights of Columbus hall on Coburg street, which has frequently been used for patriotic purposes during the last few months, will be open on Monday and Tuesday, July 5 and 6, to receive donations of articles for the stricken Serbians, such as are mentioned in a committee from the St. John Council will be present to receive them, and it is requested that donors place their contributions in the hall.

It is hoped and expected that there will be a generous response to the call, the necessity of which is apparent to everybody who has read the newspapers of late.

The sad condition of affairs in Serbia has been graphically described in a letter issued by the Canadian Red Cross Society. "For three months," says this letter, which was sent out from Toronto in May, "all Serbia has been one great charnel house of death and dying. Deaths to date have reached a grand total of 750,000."

Though the epidemic of typhus is now declared to be under control, it is freely admitted that a grim harvest of 100,000 human beings will have been reaped before it can be entirely stamped out. When the present war broke out in May, all Serbia, with a population of 5,000,000 people, only 500 doctors. The Canadian Red Cross Society, realizing the awful conditions existing in Serbia today, recently donated \$5,000 for relief in that unhappy country. The money was sent to the Canadian Red Cross Society, which is now distributing it to the many patriotic and national funds in connection with the war; out of the money the people of Canada are sure they will be able to spare a little for Serbia.
