MONTREAL, Feb. 5.—Boston's victory over Ottawa at the capital last night, has put an entirely different complexion on the National Hockey League race, and has added considerably to the interest in the coming clash between Boston and Canadiens tomorrow night at the Arena. Boston is now in fifth place, one point behind Canadiens for fourth position, and within striking distance of Pittsburgh and third place. A win for Boston tomorrow night, would send them bounding over the Canadiens and to a possible position right on the heels of the Pirates and a win to keep well up in the race, and will unquestionably be out to halt the onrushing Bruins in their belated sprint for high rating.
