REDERICTON, March 25—New Brunswick's revenue for the fiscal year ending October 31st, 1926, was estimated at \$3,fiscal year ending October 31st, 1926, was estimated at \$3,-695,771 by Hon. A. J. Leger, Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, in his first budget speech delivered in the Legislature this afternoon.

This amount is scarcely \$30,000 more than the gross revenue of the last year, despite the introduction of the predicted new forms of taxation as well as the increasing of various existent taxes, and the deficit on the current year's operations is placed at \$666,334, as compared with the gross deficit shown in the public accounts for the last year of \$756,589.
