COAL CARGOES RUSHED.

ALL BOARD OF TRADE MEMBERS WANTED IN NEW DOMINION BODY

Fees Shouldn't Exclude Them and Appeal For Dominion Assistance in Financing Departure Ought to Be Barred, Delegates Agree

NORTH BAY, Nov. 20.—Running down from Cochrane this afternoon those Board of Trade Conference delegates who left Winnipeg over the C. N. R. this morning held a meeting in the observation car to consider the matter of the Dominion Board of Trade.

S. B. Gundy was in the chair and the matter was discussed for two hours. The net result was a general agreement that every member of every Board of Trade should be a member of the Dominion Board and that there should be no fees so large as to exclude board or member, and the Dominion Board must be financed without any appeal for a Government contribution.

The board, it was declared with emphasis, must be free from any suggestion of politics or of influence by big interests or any particular section of the country. The view that there should be a central advisory council representative of all interests was favored and it was declared that the new organization must be adequately financed in order to function properly. The sum of \$25,000 was suggested but not based on any careful calculation or budget.

\$100 YEARLY OFFERED.
If that amount were necessary, John M. Inrie, of Edmonton, said he would be one of two hundred men in Canada to give a hundred dollars a year for five years and President Turnbull, of the Halifax Board of Trade, said he would be another. Mr. Inrie declared he could get others on the Edmonton board to do the same and Mr. Turnbull said the same of the Halifax board.

Some members favored appealing to Federal and Provincial Governments, but the majority asserted that the board must be independent and finance itself. Confidence that ample contributions could be secured from Board of Trade members who could afford it was expressed after the whole question had been fully discussed. Particular emphasis was placed on the importance of making every board from coast to coast to come in at a charge low enough to meet their circumstances.

SPEAKERS ENTHUSIASTIC.
The speakers were all enthusiastic over the Winnipeg conference as the most important development in relation to Canada's economic and national problems since Confederation. The Maritime Province speakers were Senator Robinson, Dr. Price and M. C. Holder, of Moncton; President Turnbull, Secretary Saunders and Col. Phinney, of Halifax; R. K. Smith, M.P., of Amherst; Senator McArthur and J. P. Gordon, of Prince Edward Island, and A. M. Belding, of Saint John. The Maritime men expressed their own appreciation of the great kindness they had met with at the conference and pledged themselves that the Maritimes would do their part to aid in establishing the Dominion Board and to prove that the Maritimes were not ungrateful of the support given their cause.

EXPRESSION OF OPINION.
Of course today's conference was merely to get an expression of opinion to assist the Boards of London, Hamilton, Toronto and Montreal to work out a scheme to be submitted to every Board and Chamber from coast to coast for their approval. The sole aim is to get a body that will not be suspected of any selfish or sectional motives, but will be the united voice of all sections, dealing with national and not merely local problems.
