Appeal in Churches.

In all of the Protestant churches in New Brunswick yesterday was a day of special appeal on behalf of the Protestant orphanage campaign, and the clergymen in St. John made eloquent pleas in support of the campaign that is to be launched today. Preaching in Trinity church in the morning Rev. Canon R. A. Armstrong spoke of the Bible and the children, taking the special instance of Ishmael and Moses. He brought home the individual responsibility for the welfare and the protection of these in need of the Protestant orphanage support for the building fund campaign. Rev. Hugh Miller, preaching in St. David's church, spoke of the various ways of making the progress of civilization, referring especially to the place of the child in the home and in the social and educational life of the church. Mr. Miller said that the inalienable rights of a child were a home and training to be useful and develop the personality of the child in the ministry of Christ. Rev. Dr. G. B. MacDonald, speaking in the Victoria street Baptist church, explained the inadequacy of the present accommodation for the Protestant orphans of the province, pointing out that the present buildings had a capacity of only 138, as compared with the accommodation provided by the Catholic people, whose buildings would house about 1,000 orphans. He put the matter clearly before the congregation, asking how the members would feel if circumstances should place their children in need of the care of the orphanage. He asked them to remember this as they made their contribution to the orphanage appeal and to give generously.

Rev. Herbert G. Fulton laid particular emphasis upon the untold possibilities of the child and its right to equality of opportunity of development, in two eloquent sermons in Conventry yesterday. In the morning he took for his text "The relation of the child to the Kingdom of God" and in the evening, "And shall perceive that God has called the child," the reference being to Samuel, who later became the great prophet of God.
