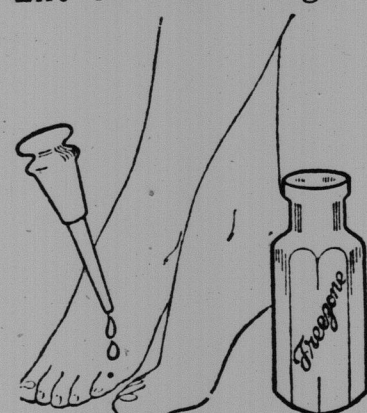

BANK VIEW OF CONDITIONS IN THE DOMINION

(Canadian Bank of Commerce). Normally in May the influx of immigrants and the resumption of inland water traffic, and of agriculture and other outdoor industries, create conditions of activity. This spring, however, the general decline of trade, varying in degree in different parts of the Dominion, the domestic transportation problem, the continued decline in price of agricultural products, and a number of other factors, present for the moment few satisfactory openings for increased exports of Canadian products are not conditions conducive to buoyancy. The best evidence of depression is the unrelenting number of unemployed in central centres and the unusually large supply of agricultural labor in all parts of the Dominion. In April and May the building trades generally absorb a substantial proportion of the available supply of casual labor, but so far this year this absorption has been below normal. There is little hope now of an early adjustment of wages and prices of building material to a level that will induce investment in new homes or industrial plants, and the rate of wages they pay have undergone marked declines, the departments of the nation's activities which produce machinery, clothing and other necessities have not undergone corresponding adjustment. The cost of producing agricultural implements is hovering near the maximum point, while the cost of transportation, particularly of coarse grains, is at a percentage of the price obtainable at central market points. Until more far-reaching adjustments take place it cannot be expected that business conditions will materially improve. Under the circumstances the extent to which the volume of retail trade has been maintained is surprising. Payments by retailers, however, and by those of their customers to whom they have given credit are not up to normal. Particularly in this case in western Canada where the severe decline in price of agricultural products has been most severely felt. This condition is not, however, local, nor nominal, but a situation in which the gloomy aspect when compared with conditions in almost any other part of the world.

IRON, STEEL AND MACHINERY MARKETS

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for the week ended May 5, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment: Market conditions are not undergoing

any marked changes, either in iron, steel or machinery tools. Managers of many warehouses are kept in an anxious state of mind between reducing stocks in order to clear out high priced material, and, on the other hand, keeping the stock sufficiently well assorted to give service

to the customers that they must give in order to hold their place in the trade. Manufacturers in the iron and steel lines are in the same position. They must, of necessity, cut their overhead severely and at the same time keep up the nucleus of an efficient and effective organization for the time when the turn of business comes.

Most of the buyers of iron and steel seem satisfied that the present quotations on these lines are reasonable and should be the ruling figures of the market for some time to come. But that is not causing an increase of buying to any marked extent and the dealers state very frankly that they do not expect this increase until the buyers find it necessary to buy for some definite manufacturing programme.

But there are some concerns that report business as being very fair. They are securing some satisfactory orders and although the volume is not as great as a year ago by any means, they are satisfied with their progress.

Prices remain much the same in the steel trade locally and it is hardly to be expected that there will be changes some time. There are variations in prices, but these come from dealers who still house more high-priced stock than they care to swing and they are letting certain tonnages pass out at a favorable figure to the buyer.

The scrap metal markets show no change. Dealers could probably secure contracts at today's figures, but they will not take them as they know it would be very difficult for them to go out and find the material necessary to fill them at today's prices. Those having scrap prefer to hold it than sacrifice at the figures of this market.
