SMOKE MACDONALD'S INDEX WARM WORDS OF PRAISE FOR THIS COUNTRY

London, May 19—(Reuters)—The Sunday Times editorially says: "Alone among all our colonial premier Sir Robert Borden will return as a living evidence that a people can and will render a service to their convictions, to their sense of right and justice to the call of blood and to the flag under which they live, at a vast and unreckoned cost to themselves, without either prepostulating and recompense or subsequently claiming any share or any indemnity or compensating spoil which might remain for distribution. Canada has fought, paid and suffered. Other great dominions have sought security for the future only, but they must be conscious that in demanding just guarantees they have also received some compensation for their sacrifices. Canada has given all and sought nothing."

"When all else is forgotten, Canada's selflessness will remain as an irrefragable proof that the empire entered the war for liberty and liberty alone."

Toronto, May 20—R. W. J. Hevey of the Toronto district trades and labor council said last night that he had received from Ottawa information that legislation providing for an eight-hour day would be introduced in the House of Commons within the next few days.

BEER DRINKING
Sir:—There seems to be a large number who do not know that the beer drinker seldom lives to be much over sixty years of age.

Beer drinkers drop off with what should have been mild and easily curable diseases. Even moderate beer-drinkers have a poorer chance of recovery, especially from blood poisoning, and pneumonia than the total abstainer. The first organs to be attacked are the kidneys and then comes Bright's disease and dropsy, certain to be fatal.

Over thirty years ago a number of medical men began advising their patients that they had better leave beer alone and drink whiskey instead, and there are few reputable physicians who would not give the same advice today.

A few years ago, J. H. Adams on behalf of the Baltimore Sun investigated the working of prohibition in some of the Southern States and he concluded that whiskey produces more violence than beer, but that beer decreases much more than whiskey, the aggregate prosperity, happiness and efficiency of the community. He said, "the beer trade, ten times more than the whiskey trade, produces the evils belonging to the sale of liquor as an institution."

The brewers are going to make a desperate effort to compel us to return to the old drunkard-making bar room. The friends of temperance must see that their names are on the voters' list and vote not to everyone of the questions. Don't miss one or it will spoil your ballot.

PHASES OF SITUATION IN WINNIPEG STRIKE

Statements by Vice-President of Big Iron Works and by Union Workers Newspaper

Winnipeg, May 20—L. R. Barrett, vice-president of the Vulcan Iron Works, one of the chief industrial plants here, said last night:—

"We can do nothing. The whole situation is in the hands of the citizens committee, and we must await action by that committee. In the meantime we are going to sit tight and make no concessions."

The Western Labor News, official organ of union workers, announced that the trainmen on government railways entering Winnipeg are ready to strike; that the C. P. R. trainmen are voting on the question; that the railway shovellers of Winnipeg and district shops, who are seeking higher pay and shorter hours, will announce their attitude today. The same paper contained intimations that the Winnipeg strike is receiving support of union forces of the other provinces, and announced that "a strong contingent of men from Toronto were being brought here to the largest department store of the city was refused transportation past Port Arthur, and that the railway workers are said to have refused to handle trains on which such persons are found."

The impression exists that if the government finally decides that the union forces have been unreasonable it will lend assistance toward a resumption of business, but if it is found that the unions were not fairly treated, it might take steps to operate certain industries under a compromise agreement. This combination of circumstances, it is believed, is responsible for the remarkable order that has been maintained since the strike began. It is known that scores of investigators are checking every move and it is felt that a rapid succession of events will follow if the conciliatory agencies declared that the deadlock is too powerful to be broken by peaceful arbitration.

ALLIES' REPLY TO ONE OF GERMAN NOTES

Answer to Protest Against Economic Terms of Peace Treaty Regarded as Fine Piece of Work

Paris, May 19—(By the Associated Press)—A reply by the Allied and associated governments to the German note protesting against the economic terms of the peace treaty as being calculated to cause the industrial ruin of Germany has been delivered to the German peace plenipotentiaries. The reply declares that the Allies are framing the economic terms "had no intention to destroy Germany's economic life."

On the contrary, the report points out that in the reconstruction of the world's affairs Germany will have her part in the progressive development, but also will share with the rest of the world in the economic losses and disadvantages inevitably resulting from the war.

The reply declares that the German note fails to take into consideration the fact that the disarmament of Germany and the end of militarism will relieve the German people of an immense burden of taxation and return to the world the full production millions of men formerly in the army who have been entirely withdrawn from industrial or agricultural activity.

The reply also makes an emphatic rejoinder to the German complaint that the loss of the German merchant marine will throw out of work thousands of German merchant seamen. The Allies' answer is that the destruction of merchant ships, chiefly by German submarines, has had the unfortunate effect of limiting the opportunities for the work of seamen throughout the world, the Allied powers being the greatest sufferers. It adds that there clearly is no reason why Germany should be exempted from its

share of the economic disadvantages growing out of this destruction of merchant ships.

The reply on the economic objections is regarded as one of the best documents in the exchange of notes.

SEVENTY-THREE OF OUR OFFICERS ROSE TO RANK OF BRIGADIER-GENERAL.

Ottawa, May 20—Seventy-three officers of the Canadian expeditionary force rose to the rank of brigadier-general during the war, according to a return tabled in the House of Commons yesterday. They included twenty majors and five captains.
