Alfalfa in Wisconsin is one of the best crops from a direct cash standpoint, alticough it will never be marketed to any great extent in that way. In Waukesha county the single cutting of a new seeding sold for \$16 per acre standing in the field.

But in Wisconsin alfalfa will be fed to stock and marketed in the form of milk and meat. It is in this form that it will bring the highest returns. It is the premier stock food. Many other foods have high feeding value in certain elements, but none are approachable to alfalfa a more balanced ration, but in that balance it contains those elements most needed by growing stock and dairy cows—elements at once most needed and most expensive to buy. This situation is well supplied by clover, but much better by alfalfa. It is evident, then, that sections fitted to the production of alalfalfa have an advantage over others.
