STRAY BULLET KILLS VERMONT FARMER

Farmer, After a Load of Wood, Shot Through the Brain

Battleboro, Vermont, Nov. 25.—A stray bullet from an unknown hunter's rifle probably killed John Wait, a farmer and lumberman, whose body was found yesterday in the woods in Peru. That was the conclusion to which State Attorney W. J. Meagher and Deputy Sheriff Godfrey came to day after an investigation.

Wait had gone to the woods after a load of lumber, and when his horses returned home without him, his father, Ira Wait, started a search and found him lying dead beside a wood pile on which he had been working. A bullet had pierced his brain.

Wait was forty years old and leaves a family.

QUEBEC HAS HALF MILLION SURPLUS OVER ALL EXPENDITURES

Quebec, Nov. 25.—A total ordinary revenue of \$8,895,787.19; a total ordinary expenditure of \$7,210,169.99; a total extraordinary expenditure of \$841,828.28, and a surplus of \$828,911.14 of ordinary revenue over both ordinary and extraordinary expenditure, were the announcements with which the provincial treasurer, Hon. Mr. Meagher, opened his budget speech this afternoon, in which he summed up the results of the fiscal year ended on 30th June last.

NATHAN STRAUSS TO RETIRE

Will Devote Himself Entirely to His Humanitarian Work

New York, Nov. 25.—To devote himself entirely to humanitarian work, it is understood that Nathan Strauss, long a leading figure in the mercantile world, has retired from active business. Nathan Strauss Jr., said his father's enterprises in Palestine need more careful attention, and that he would shortly leave for the Holy Land accompanied by his son, to spend several months extending the work of the relief bureau and other charitable undertakings he has inaugurated there. His son said that a world-wide personal campaign to urge the universal adoption of pasteurization of all milk fed to infants is expected to form a part of his philanthropic activities in the comparatively near future.

WHAT WAS MISSED WHEN RECIPROcity WAS DEFEATED

Presque Isle, Maine, Nov. 25.—Aroostook readers will be interested in the statement of the prevailing prices of farm products in the town of Andover, N. B., just across the line from Fort Fairfield. Potatoes were at the present rate three are \$1.16 to \$1.20, as compared with \$1.40 to \$1.50 here; eggs, 80 to 85 cents; butter about the same, hay \$10 and \$11, oats 40 to 44 cents a bushel of 84 pounds.

Along the border numerous buyers from Maine are going into the Province of New Brunswick, and paying the farmers good prices for cattle, sheep, pigs, fowls, butter, eggs and other products of the farm. The farmers near the line on the New Brunswick side, are plowing up big tracts of land and buying large quantities of fertilizer, preparatory to putting in big crops of potatoes next season.

Young Woman Kidnapped

Miss Lois Piper, aged eighteen years, of Fairfield, Me., has returned home after an absence of several days during which time keen anxiety was caused by her parents and friends. She says that she paid a visit to a motion picture house in Waterville, Me., and while there made the acquaintance of a refined-looking, middle-aged woman, who during the evening treated her to some candy. She says there must have been a drug in the candy, and that after she had taken it, she became weak. She was then placed in an automobile with two men and taken to Boston, where she was kept in a house for about a week. Later she was released and sent to Portland. Miss Piper has been a school teacher at Fairfield. The federal authorities are being asked to investigate.

GREAT PICTURE BALL FOR LONDON

Queen Promises Patronage for an Elaborate Christmas Carnival

London, Nov. 25.—Lady Muriel Paget, aided by G. Sherwood Foster, is arranging the first of the great semi-public balls which for some years have been such notable events.

Last winter it was "The Pantomime Ball," in which about twenty of the prettiest girls of society made up a procession of "dancing pinqueens." In June it was the summer ball and pageant, a spectacle of magnificence and beauty entitled "The Court of Versailles."

This winter's ball promises to be equally successful and even more interesting. It is to be known as "A Picture Ball and Christmas Carnival," and again the queen has promised her patronage. It will take place on December 8, in the Albert Hall, and the proceeds from the tickets of which the first thousand are to be sold at £1 each, are to be devoted to the funds of the Invalid Kitchen of London.
