NOTABLE CONTESTS

The Country Club, Brookline, Mass., Sept. 6.—The contention for the amateur golf championship of the United States settled into a conflict of champions yesterday. Reduction of the field of thirty-two men in the first day of match play was recorded with all but six of the sixteen survivors, champions or former champions.

A little known champion, Rudy Knopfer of Sioux City, trans-Mississippi titlist, supplied the best sensation of the day. Five holes behind the burly British star, William Torrance, at the end of the morning round of eighteen holes, Knopfer, a little fellow, went out in the afternoon and played a round of severity, equalling Jesse E. Guilford's course record, and allowing Torrance to win only one hole of the last eighteen. Knopfer's victory by two up was gained with a gallery of hundreds ringing round the greens.

A potential champion, Bobby Jones of Atlanta, playing against an early handcap of two down, brought his deadly putting opponent, J. J. Beadle of the Llanerch Country Club, Philadelphia, to

Chuck Evans, Chicago's champion of champions, was called upon for his best by the veteran John Anderson of New York. THE MAYFLOWER STANDS STRAIN OF ACTUAL WORK

New York, Sept. 6.—"The Mayflower found herself," declares the Tribune editorially, "disqualified from the international fishermen's race last year because she had not proved her worth as a bona fide fishing boat, she at once set forth for the Banks, and has been doing the full work of a regular member of the fishing fleet ever since. Her catch has been as good as the best of the crafts of Gloucester."

"In this manner has the Mayflower answered her critics. Though built in the old yards at Essex, they claimed that as she was planned by Burgess she was built to run rather than to be useful. But, yacht or no yacht, she is now redolent of codfish and is equal to the trials of the Banks. As a matter of fact, many of the best fishermen consider her yachts—their lines slender and graceful and their canvas rigged for speed."

"The Mayflower, therefore, is now eligible to enter the preliminary races in Gloucester harbor early in October to contest for the honor of representing the United States against the Canadian contender. She has withered every wrack and proved she is more than a racing machine. If to her falls the duty of carrying the American colors, let it be said again, 'May the best boat win.'"

BOXING COMMISSION SUSPENDS JACKSON


