SECOND EDITION. BLIZZARD.

IT HAS BEEN RAGING CONTINUOUSLY FOR A WEEK. Ten Persons Dead and Thousands of Cattle Dying From Starvation and Thirst.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 21.—At least ten persons and thousands of cattle and sheep have perished in the blizzard which began with the year and raged over Washington for a week. Reports from Colville reservation are to the effect that cattle are dying by hundreds from starvation and thirst and that the ground is covered with over two feet of snow on the level and in some places has drifted mountain high.

The keeper of the stage station, 12 miles from Almas, started to walk to town last Thursday, and on Sunday his body was found on the prairie, a mile from his home, frozen stiff.

The mail carrier at Wild Goose Creek perished on the same day, and eight cattle men are known to have lost their lives in the storm.

The cattle men believe they will lose one-half of their herds.

AN ENGLISHMAN'S FINE. They Have Sounded the Portland Sailing Works and Some Mining Properties.

PORTLAND, Me., Jan. 21.—An English syndicate has bought the Portland Sailing Works and some mining properties, and the principal owners, has gone to England to complete the sale of the property.

The syndicate will put in enlarging smelting works. They have also bought a number of mines of zinc, lead and silver along the coast of Maine, and propose to bring large quantities of ore here for smelting.

The syndicate is composed of practical miners, who say that the Maine ore is much richer than a large portion of that which is worked profitably in Scotland and England. The concern is representative of great wealth and its operations are expected to benefit Portland largely.

LORD NAPIER'S FURTEL. An Impending Military Procession to St. Paul's Cathedral.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The funeral of Field Marshal Lord Napier of Magdala took place today. The body was buried in St. Paul's cathedral. There was only one military procession from the Tower of London of which Lord Napier was Constable, to the cathedral. The Queen and other members of the Royal family sent wreaths. The Prince of Wales, the Duke of Cambridge and other high officers of the British army, and members of the diplomatic corps, received the coffin at the grand portico of the cathedral.

ROUGH WEATHER AT SEA. The British steamer 'Gallia' has been wrecked on the coast of Newfoundland.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The steamer Gallia, of Queenstown from New York, reports the roughest passage the captain ever experienced. Five of the life boats were smashed and the steamer narrowly escaped generally. A panic among the passengers on Friday was caused by the sea flooding the cabin. The Gallia on Friday sighted a large steamer, with only one mast standing, at the mercy of the elements. The steamer was apparently one of the Johnston line plying between Liverpool and Baltimore.

HALIFAX MATTERS. A Child Buried to Death—A Well Known Druggist Killed.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 21.—The two-year old child of Robert Peach, residing on Gorington street was buried to death last night. The child was playing with the fire when it clothing caught.

J. B. Gordon, druggist, died this morning after one day's illness.

ACCIDENT ON THE I. C. R. A Broken Axle the Cause—Birkenshaw Killed and Conductor Little Injured.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 21.—There was an accident on the I. C. R. this morning between Union and Valley station caused by a broken axle. Birkenshaw, A. E. Murray was killed and conductor Little injured.

ARRESTED IN VANCOUVER. An Englishman Charged with Issuing Bogus Checks.

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 21.—An Englishman named Callaghan who professes to be the brother-in-law of Richard Webster, Attorney-General of England, has been arrested at Vancouver for obtaining money under false pretences and issuing bogus checks.

CHIEF RABBI ADLER DIED. An Englishman Charged with Issuing Bogus Checks.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Nathan Marcus Adler D. D., Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew congregation of the British Empire died today.

Dr. Adler was born at Hanover in 1803 and received his education in the Universities of Gottingen, Erlangen and Wurzburg. He was installed chief Rabbi on 9th July 1848. Dr. Adler wrote 'Sermons on the Jewish Faith' and several Hebrew works.

No Eastern mails have reached San Francisco over land trains have been able to reach a point further west than Colfax. The East-bound train at Sacramento, Colfax and Shady Run, while those coming West are at Emigrant Gap, Truckee and Reno. At Truckee the depth of snow ranges from 5 feet to drifts of 20 feet.

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DETECTIVE HAD NERVE. GRAVES GANG SURROUNDED BY POLICE.

They Hanged the Road House Door and Tossed the Bodies of the Victims into the Street.

BOSTON, Me., Jan. 18.—Detective McNamara, the Boston officer who was recently engaged by the Maine game commission to break up the gang of disciples of Cal Greaves, the game warden murderer, had another adventure yesterday morning, which eclipses the first one when he described upon the two boys and arrested them and made them suffer heavily.

He has continued his crusade at the request of the game commission, although the poachers have sent him word that they should shoot him.

Thursday he found another one of the boys, and he arrested him, and took him to Ellsworth, where he paid the heaviest fine the law allows.

This was too much for the boys, and they fled to the woods, where they were followed by the police. They were all afraid of McNamara on account of his past deeds, and not one of them stirred, knowing that he would keep his word.

He told them that he would give them three minutes to leave the place before he arrested and took the whole party to Ellsworth.

McNamara knew that they had arrived by the noise, and with what men he could muster to his aid he left the hotel by a rear door and walked around behind them. All of his party were heavily armed, and the detective, who has but one hand, carried a revolver with which he was exceedingly expert.

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SECOND EDITION. BANKING.

THE BANK OF ENGLAND TO USE SILVER.

It is Within the Bank's Right and is Canceled by the Heavy Exports of Goods from India.

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Yesterday it was stated that the Bank of England had decided to use silver to the extent of one-third of its reserve, and issue one pound notes in silver against it.

The Bank is said to have purchased 2,000,000 of silver bullion already in anticipation of this action.

Forexchange when asked about this report, said: "We received the information from our London correspondent as a rumor, but there are several circumstances that point to its being true. For six weeks there has been a strong demand for silver in England. In spite of the large shipments from this country, the price there has actually risen. This shows there has been a big buyer over there, which is not the case of England's silver supply. If the report is true, it signifies two great changes in the system of banking in England. Hitherto the notes of a lower denomination than five pounds have been issued, but the English have always been stronger than any other nation in favor of a gold standard."

The rumor created no comment in Wall street, for the reason that the large banking houses with a foreign connection had no objection to the subject. It was explained that England's call for silver recently has been due to the heavy export of goods from India, which have been draining not only the India coinage of bills and silver, but some gold as well.
