To organize a Federation, each union agrees to pay into a guarantee fund for one year, the cents per week (or such other sum as may be mutually agreed upon), at the end of one year they are full members of the Pederation, and unless any one of the winous form ing the Federation are on stylke or lock out, they then cease paying dottl such time as any of their number are involved in a dispute, when they immediately commone paying their weekly governer and continue paying us long as the dispute continue.

The guarantee fund in the ease of the 29 unions forming the building section of this Council would approximate on the basis of membership quoted \$19.278—not a bad argument for the consideration of the Ruilders' Exchange—and doubtless would have been found exceedingly useful in the recent struggle of the builders' laborers.

2. No trade or branch would be en titled to any strike from the Federation until the full year's dues are paid.

& Any trade or branch having forfeited its guarantee, and wishing to rejoon the Federation would have to pay the full guarantee again and submit to such other penalties as the other trades thought proper before being re-admitted.

6. In cases of disputes, where a strike is contemplated by any trade or branch, a meeting of the Federation is called for its consideration and endorsement or otherwise. The voting power of each branch in consideration of pending strikes is governed by the strencth of the trude branch in dispute.
