Religious News

ST. BONIFACE, Man. — The Rev. P. Dandurand, O. M. I., will complete his hundredth year, March 23. The celebration of this event will be held on the 25th. The jubilarian will say his mass in the Cathedral at nine o'clock and Archbishop Beliveau will deliver the sermon.

EDMONTON. — On the 28th ult. His Grace Archbishop Legal formally opened the new building taken over by the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity for their Rescue work. A very large gathering attended the opening ceremony amongst whom were His Honor Lieutenant Governor Brett, Mayor Clarke, etc.

MONTREAL, Que. — The Inspector General of the Christian Brothers' Schools in the Montreal District, Brother Theodore, died of pneumonia on the last day of Feb. in the mother house of his congregation at Laval-des-Rapides. He was the last survivor of the seven brothers who came to Ottawa in Nov. 1864 for founding in the Capital the first of the Brothers' Schools.

— On the 23rd of last month Mgr. Brunet celebrated Holy Mass for the first time in the new cathedral of Mont Laurier, in the northern part of the Province of Quebec. This new Cathedral is not only a monument of faith, perseverance, and generosity, but is also

a monument of artistic taste that can well bear comparison with the older cathedrals in the province.

NEW YORK. — Plans for the organization by the Roman Catholic, Greek, Russian and Protestant Churches of a league similar to that of the proposed society of nations, "to co-operate in Christian work as brethren," will be laid before the Pope by three Protestant bishops, was announced here by Rt. Rev. R. H. Weller, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin.

— Rev. Bro. A. P. Kennedy, master of novices in this country of the teaching order of the Christian Brothers of Ireland, died at St. Mary's Novitiate, Mamaroneck, N. Y., in his sixty-fourth year. He taught for thirty-four years at St. John's, Newfoundland, being transferred in 1916 as master of Novices.

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — Rev. T. B. Brown, C.S.S.R., rector of St. Alphonsus Church, St. Louis, passed away. He was born 1857 at Savannah, Ga., and was ordained to the priesthood in 1885.

— St. Mary's Hospital at Jefferson City, Mo., one of the largest and most up-to-date hospitals in central Missouri, was destroyed by fire. All patients were removed in safety.

CINCINNATI, O. — Rev. Adolf J. Beckman, professor of philosophy at Mt. St. Mary Seminary, died at Seton Hospital, here.

TOLEDO, O. — On March 7th Rev. Michael Puetz, for many years pastor of St. Augustine's Church, Napoleon, O., celebrated the golden jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood.

CLEVELAND, O. — A campaign was started on Feb. 10th for \$50,000 needed to complete the new St. Vincent's High School in Akron. In five days \$50,450 was collected from church members. The new high school building will be one of the most up-to-date in Ohio, and about 900 students are expected to attend.

COLUMBUS, Ohio. — The American Academy of Christian Democracy, a training school for nurses and social workers, was partly destroyed by fire.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Rev. M. H. Zumbusch, O.C.R., died at Gethsemany Abbey, Ky., Feb. 25th. He was in the eighty-third year of his age and was priest for fifty-eight years. For twenty-six years he was totally blind.

— The Cincinnati Franciscan Province mourns the loss of Father Lucian Hurtig, who died a victim of the flu. He was ordained last November, twenty-nine years of age, and was a native of Hartford, Kansas.

ST. PAUL, Minn. — Burglars entered the Holy Redeemer Church at Marshall, Minn., and took away gold and silver vessels valued at \$300.

FARGO, N. D. — Rev. Daniel O'Callaghan, formerly pastor at Starkweather, N. D., died in Philadelphia, Feb. 17th.

OKLAHOMA. — Brother Boniface John Moser, O. S. B., passed away at the Benedictine Abbey, Sacred Heart, Okla.

SANTA FE. — Chaplain Fr. A. Lederle died at Fort Stanton, N.M., of pneumonia.

LONDON, Engl. — Rev. Herbert Cooper, M.A., recently Vicar of Berry Pomeroy, has been received into the Church by Abbot Cammings at Knaresborough.

SPALDING. — Mr. Wm. Parker bought the N.E. 1/4 of Sec. 14-40-18 from Mr. Mike Vetterl, formerly owned by Mr. J. H. Dosman. 90 acres are cultivated. The price was \$21.50 per acre.

— At the meeting of the councillors of the R. M. of Spalding held at Watson, on March 1st, among others the following decisions were passed: That Dr. F. R. Nicolle be appointed Medical Health Officer for 1919; that the government grant of \$500 be spent as follows: \$150 E. of 18 and 19 in 37-17, \$150 N. of 7, 8 and 9 in 39-17, \$200 N. of 7, 8 and 9 in 39-16; that the council request a grant from the government of \$600 to be used E. of 5, 8, and 17 in 38-18 and \$600 E. of 20, 29 and 32 in 38-18; that the council request a grant from the government of \$1000 to be used E. of 5, 8, 17, 20, 29, 32 in 37-16 and \$1500 E. of 5, 8, 17 in 38-16; that each division be authorized to expend up to \$200 on account of 1919 apportionment; that the following be appointed weed inspectors for 1919: Div. 1 W. Mickeljohn, Div. 2 Wm. Wilson, Div. 3 Sam Dunn, Div. 4 Reg. Rogers, Div. 5 Jos. Iverson, Div. 6 Ed. Brenna and that the rate of remuneration be \$5.00 per day.

Since Jan. 8th he was a patient at the City and County Hospital at St. Paul, where he was operated. He expects to leave the hospital again in about a week or two.

LENORA LAKE. — At the annual meeting of the parishioners of St. Anthony's Church, Lenora Lake, the following gentlemen were elected trustees: Nic. Schuller, Geo. Gerwing, Herm. Schmitz, John Politesky and John Wolsfeld. This meeting should have been held at the beginning of this year, but owing to the prevalence of the so-called Spanish Influenza which was then raging within the confines of the parish, it was postponed till now.

— Mr. John Wolsfeld who was a visitor in the United States seek relief for his ailments, returned to Lenora Lake on Thursday of last week. Though his condition was not notably improved, he is glad to be back home again. Mr. and Mrs. Albert Gerwing-Mr. Wm. Gerwing and Mr. and Mrs. Lynch who were also sojourning in the land of the stars and stripes during the past couple of weeks, likewise returned to Lenora Lake, last week.

— A beautiful processional Cross has been donated to St. Anthony's Church by one of its members.

— The Central Telephone Office which up to the present has been in charge of Mr. Math Glabus, will shortly be installed in the home of Mrs. Agnes Gerwing who has already accepted the contract to that effect. In order to be able to give efficient service Mrs. Gerwing will build an addition to her present place of habitation.

HUMBOLDT. — Western delegations, which in company with John Campbell, of Nelson, went to Toronto and interviewed President Hanna of the National Railways regarding certain branch lines and extensions desired in various parts of the west, are well satisfied with the results of the conference. The president assured the Melfort Saskatchewan-Humboldt deputation that the road from St. Brieux to Humboldt would be completed this year; that rails would be laid for 20 miles on the Vonda spur toward Melfort, and that from Melfort northeastward into the Carrot river district from 30 to 40 miles will be graded to be ready for steel next year. It was further stated that the question of linking up the Vonda spur with Melfort and thereafter with Saskatchewan would be investigated.

— The total loss caused by the fire which destroyed the store occupied by Messrs. Rabinovitch & Kaplan, on March 2nd, is estimated to amount \$30,000. This firm sustained the heaviest loss. Their stock was valued at \$19,000, besides an addition onto the premises which was their property, and fixtures, valued at \$1,500, making their total loss \$20,500. They had insurance on the stock of \$10,000.

Mr. J. M. Crerar, who had his law offices on the second floor, says he has suffered a loss of between \$4,000 and \$5,000. He valued his law library alone at \$2,500; and in addition many valuable papers, furniture, etc., which he estimated would mean a loss of nearly another \$2,500. He had no insurance. The building was owned by R. J. Kepkey and valued at about \$2,000. It was a frame building, erected several years ago and was first used as a post office.

— The Caesarean operation, the first of its kind to be undertaken in Humboldt, was performed by Dr. McCutcheon at St. Elizabeth hospital on Sunday night, March 2nd, when Mrs. Leo Bohl, of Dead Moose Lake, gave birth to a daughter. It is an operation rarely heard of and resulted in saving the life of the mother and child, who are both doing well. Though the Caesarian section is a serious and dangerous operation, it is, certainly and by all means, to be preferred to another dangerous operation which is very often resorted to, namely craniotomy, which invariably results in the death of the child, even before it can be baptized—and not infrequently, alas, in the death of the mother. The Catholic Church puts craniotomy, embryotomy and other operations which directly result in the death of the child on the same level as homicide. Dr. McCutcheon is, therefore, highly to be commended for having had recourse to the Caesarian section in preference to other operations that so easily brush aside God's commandment which says: "Thou shalt not kill."

— Mr. F. I. Hauser, went to Regina last week to represent Humboldt at the convention of the Saskatchewan Rural Municipalities.

— Sgt. Major Norman Driver, Corpl. Carl Jensen and Pte. A. J. Anstett, all three Humboldt soldiers, returned home last week from overseas.

— In view of the exertions and work done by the Humboldt board of trade to further the interests of the farmer districts the Rural Municipality of Humboldt at the monthly meeting of its councillors on March 1st has voted a grant of \$200 to the said board of trade with the request that the sec. treas. of the municipality be made a member of the executive of the board of trade. At the same meeting F. I. Hauser was appointed assessor for 1919. A grant of \$50 was made to the Salvation Army Red Shield Fund. John Kuechle was appointed pound-keeper for Div. 2, in place of Jos. Burton, resigned, pound to be located on S. E. 33-37-23. The account of F. Heidegger, \$75.00, auditing books, was ordered paid. Motion passed at meeting Jan. 7th last, authorizing payment of \$1.00 per pelt bounty on bush and prairie wolves, was cancelled.
