Pope Leo XIII and Arbitration. The Roman Catholic Church, under the inspiration of Pope Leo XIII, proposes to consecrate the remaining days of this fast expiring century to special intercession on behalf of 'peace on earth and good will among men.'

The efforts it may make to attain this most desirable end, every church in Christendom will not only wish to God speed but give it their enthusiastic assistance to accomplish such a most desirable work. This is only one of the many measures for the good of humanity that Pope Leo has advocated and wished the nations of Europe to adopt, and it proves that he is not only the best but the greatest Pope that this century has produced.

The attitude that Pope Leo has taken upon this all important question is noble and praiseworthy. As he is the head and representative of more than one-third of the population of the Christian world, he can make himself felt as no other guardian of civilization in behalf of the establishment of arbitration and the abolition of war, which will be a great forward step in civilization.

There was a lively debate in the United States Senate at Washington which lasted for several days but terminated on Friday last over granting right of way for railroads in the district of Alaska. During the discussion the old fisheries question played a prominent part and a clause intended to make Canada grant concessions which would kill the Canadian route was defeated by a vote of 34 to 16.
