The St. Peter's stated that they will not make the concession to their opponents in allowing Rogers to play.

A meeting of the team representatives will be held this evening. The matter in dispute will be discussed then. An effort will be made by the management of the St. Peter's team to have the professional ban lifted by the M. P. A. A. The North End team is anxious to play the Halifax Crescents or Wanderers.

Within the next few days a schedule of five games between the Marathons and St. Peter's for the city championship will be arranged.

THE FIRST HALF HOLIDAY IS DUE TOMORROW

Stores Will Remain Open Until Ten O'clock This Evening—Attractions for Saturday.

The leading dry goods establishments of the city will close their doors at 1 o'clock tomorrow. The closing will mark the inauguration of the Saturday half holiday during the summer months. The King street stores and a few of the North End establishments have decided to close. The stores in every instance will remain open until 10 o'clock this evening.

There will be a large number of attractions for the first half holiday. As usual the river affords plenty of enjoyment. There will be races at Westmount in the afternoon. Base ball matches and the parks will also be centres of attraction for a large number.

Over six hours will be spent at the shrine. The return will be made on Thursday next.

INCREASED DOG TAX CAUSES ANOTHER HOWL

Rates Doubled on July 1st and Dog Owners Don't Like it a Bit.

With the first of the month, which arrived yesterday, the dog tax was doubled, according to the recent change in the city by-law. Until July 1st the rate is one dollar for a license for a dog and two dollars for a bitch.

When the change was made lots of protests were heard from the owners of the female dogs in spite of the fact that they escaped much more easily than was at first intended. That protest, however, was nothing to the howl that was made this morning when several citizens reached the office of the Mayor's clerk with the intention of paying their dog tax and found that that rates had gone up to two and four dollars. There were some vigorous protests and the mayor, the chamberlain, the comptroller, the chief of police and his worship the Mayor were all appealed to in an effort to escape the extra tax. There was no relief to be found even from any of these exalted officials as the law reads clearly enough to make any different interpretation possible. Most of the dog owners refused to pay anything when they found they could not escape at the old figure and decided to await further developments before taking out a license.
