The Canadian Pacific railway receipts for the past week record an increase of \$93,000 over the same period last year. Four more bodies of supposed suicides have been found in the Thames, making twenty-one bodies found in the river dur-ing the last three weeks.

Earthquakes at and near the town of Tehuantepec, in the southern part of Mex-ico, continue and many people have left the place. Several abooks have been felt in the city of Oazaca.

Mr. Farrell, the retiring American mini-ster in Turkey, left Constantinople for Athena, on Tuesday, en route for the United States. The retiring minister had been accorded a personal andience with the Sultar the Sultan.

It is announced today that over 6,000 lives have been lost in the earthquake dis-trubances which have recently visited the province of Assan. A message of condol-ence has been received from Queen Victoria.

The plebiscite taken in Moncton on Fri-day on the question of the issue of \$40,000 bonds for the erection of a new school building resulted in favor of the issue of bonds. The vote stood 339 to 172 in favor of the new building.




