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The new College Building, to be known as "The Centennial Memorial Hall," the eastern wing of which is to be called "The Black Memorial Chapel," in honor of the Rev. William Black, the founder of Methodism in the Maritime Provinces, is now completed, and will be formally opened at the beginning of the term in September next. This building—in addition to the Chapel, Museum, and Library—will furnish ample accommodation for the different departments of instruction. The apartments to be used as laboratory and lecture rooms for Chemistry and Physics will be fitted up with the most modern appliances for practical illustration and experiment.

The building is of red sandstone, with basement courses, coigns, and arches of light olive freestone. It is 95 feet in length by 50 feet in width, and two stories high above the basement. The central tower is 70 feet high. The windows of the Library and Chapel are of stained glass, among which are two beautiful and costly Memorial Windows, one to the memory of Hon. Charles F. Allison, the founder of the Institutions, provided at the expense of the late Mrs. Charles F. Allison; the other, to the memory of the Rev. William Black, given by his grandson, Martin P. Black, Esq., of Halifax.
