JEW IS MEMBER OF QUEBEC LEGISLATURE

Quebec, Nov. 10.—For the first time in history, a Jew became a member of the Quebec Legislature this week. With hat on head, and hand on the Old Testament, Mr. Peter Bercovitch, Liberal member for Montreal, St. Louis division, took the oath.

In 1898 a Jew, Ezekiel Hart, was elected for Three Rivers, but he was not allowed to take his seat because he could not take the oath upon his true faith as a Christian. So he resigned and went back to his constituents, who re-elected him by a big majority than ever. But before he had time to take his seat, the Legislature was dissolved.

Twenty-seven years later, Mr. Louis J. Papineau brought in a bill doing away with the disabilities of the Jew, but from that time to this there has been no Jew officially on the floor of the House.

Mr. Peter Bercovitch, a bright lawyer, 37 years old, therefore, has the distinction of being the first Israelite to sit in His Majesty's Parliament in the province of Quebec and he received a cordial welcome from English-speaking and French-speaking members alike, belonging to both sides of politics. His parents were immigrants from Warsaw, Poland.
