**GERMANS FIGHT** HARD JUST NOW

**Canadians and English Engaged in Bitter Street** Fighting With Enemy on Three Sides of Cambrai. Which Is Suffering Heavily From Gunfire and Is Burning.

Enemy Makes Deep Withdrawal From the Vesle and West of Rheims-French Advance Next To. Argonne-Americans Fighting Hard East of **Argonne Forest.**

London, Oct. 2-The outstanding features of Foch's gigantic operation which will rush the German armies before they can retire on the new defensive system are, first, the widening of the line at Flanders until at periphery it is almost forty miles in width, showing the notable progress being made by the British, Belgians and French in the directions throughout Lille, second, the firing of Cambrai by the Germans with the envelopment of both Cambrai and St. Quentin, where the fighting rages violently under unfavorable weather conditions; third, the deep withdrawal of the enemy from Vesle and the west of Rheims; fourth, the fine advance by the French next to Argonne, and fifth, the terrific fighting of the Americans on the eastern side of the forest. The German resistance has stiffened on all battlefronts, conequently the progress is less spectacular, but everywhere the enemy is recoiling under the mighty blows of the Allies.

Sweep Toward Lille.

The Belgian communique reveals the fact that the French were co-oprating against Arnim, who has received assistance in his desperat efforts to break the waves beating eastward through Finders Mud and rain and more fresh reserves served to chec's only temporarily th Allies in their sweep southward to wards Lille.

London, Oct. 2.—The Germans are in retreat over a wide front north and south of LaBassies Canal, with the British slosely following them, abcording to Field Marshal Haig's report from headquarters to-night. The Germans have lost further ground to the British in the outakirts of Cambral and northwest of Mirty, but northeast of St. Guentin the British, under a violent counterattack, have been forced from the village of Sequehart, according to Field Marshal Haig's re-

The text follows: "This morning the enemy attacked strongly northeast of St. Quen-tin with fresh troops from his reserves and succeeded in pressing back our troops from the village of Sequehart when his progress stopped. "Local fighting has taken place today north of Greveder (south of Cambral) and west of Cambral, but without material change in the sit-uation. As a result of their operations yesterday and last hight in the neighborhood of Cambral, Ganadian treops now hold the suburb of Neu-ville St. Remy and the high ground west of Ramilles. "Early this morning the enemy commenced to withdraw on a wide front south and north of La Basse Canal. 'Our troops are following the withdrawal closely and have taken prisoners."

## **Enemy Has Prepared To** Withdraw From Country

Amsterdam, Oct. 2-Plans for the evacuation of Belgium, if necessary, have already been prepared, according to Baron Von Falkenhausen, military governor of Belgium, press despatches received here today reported.




