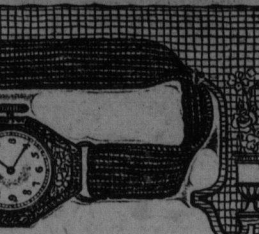

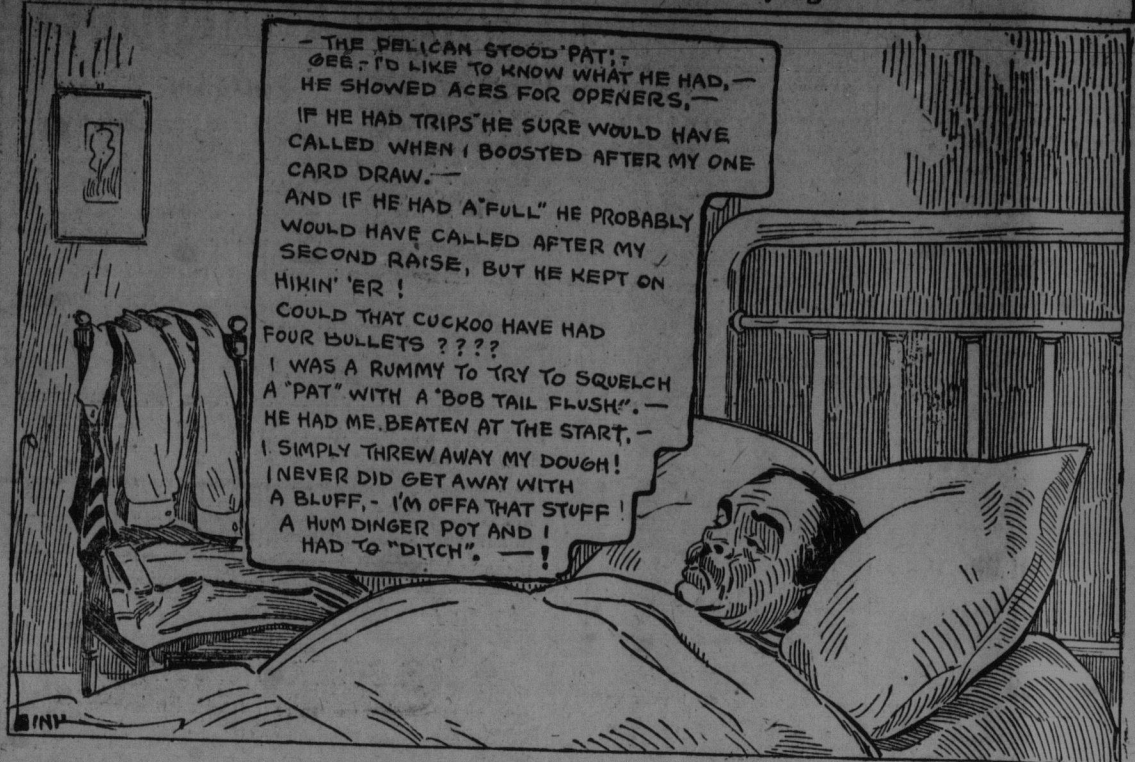

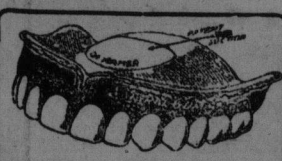

Common Council Meeting Yesterday

Mayor Gave Notice of Reso-
 lution Providing for Bond
 Issues Totalling \$318,000
 — Money Needed for
 Public Works — Tenders
 Awarded.

At the Council meeting yesterday
 the Mayor gave notice that at the
 expiration of 30 days he would move
 a resolution providing for bond issues
 totalling \$318,000. The issues will be
 as follows:

\$206,000 for 40 years at 5 p.c.
 \$37,500 for 20 years at 5 1/2 p.c.
 \$33,500 for 20 years at 5 1/2 p.c.
 \$41,500 for 40 years at 5 p.c.
 The resolution follows:
 Resolved, that, occasion having
 arisen in the public interest for the
 following Public Civil Works and needed
 civic improvements that is to say:
 for water extension on the Red Head
 Road \$40,000; for water extension on
 Douglas Avenue \$18,000; for water ex-
 tension on Brussels Street \$40,000;
 for water extension on City Road \$56,
 000; for water extension on King
 Street \$14,000; for water extension on
 Duke Street \$3,500; for water extension
 on Adelaide Road \$2,500; for water
 extension on the Market Square
 \$1,800; and for water extension on
 Hawthorne Avenue \$9,200; for sewer-
 age extension on Brussels Street \$6,
 000; for sewerage extension on Doug-
 las Avenue \$6,000; for sewerage ex-
 tension on Hawthorne Avenue \$4,800;
 to meet the expenditure for which public
 civic works and needed civic improve-
 ments that is to say: the purchase of
 two stone crushers for the Public Works
 Department \$5,500; the paving of a
 portion of Germain Street \$3,500; and
 the renewing of the piling on the Ferry
 Approaches, Saint John West, \$22,500;
 to meet the expenditure for which public
 civic works and needed civic improve-
 ments that is to say: to borrow the sum
 of thirty-seven thousand and five hundred
 dollars.

Resolved, that, occasion having
 arisen in the public interest for the
 following Public Civil Works and needed
 civic improvements that is to say:
 for retaining wall on City Road \$1,677;
 for retaining wall on Main Street \$10,351;
 for retaining wall on the Old Burying
 Ground \$975; for retaining wall on Guilford
 Street \$600; for retaining wall on Peters
 Street \$809; for retaining wall on
 Street \$2,225; and for granite curbing
 and setting \$17,560; to meet the ex-
 penditure for which public civic works
 and needed civic improvements that is to
 say: to borrow the sum of forty-one
 thousand and five hundred dollars.

Resolved, that, occasion having
 arisen in the public interest for the
 following Public Works and needed civic
 improvements that is to say: for the
 construction of the shed and drop at
 Reed's Point Wharf \$1,000; for the re-
 newal of the pile bracing at the ferry
 slip on the eastern side of the harbour
 \$1,980; the restoration of the North
 Rodney Wharf \$32,000; for driving
 piles at the ferry approaches, East
 Side, \$1,520; to meet the expenditure
 for which public civic works and needed
 civic improvements that is necessary
 to borrow the sum of thirty-three
 thousand and five hundred dollars.

A resolution authorizing the exten-
 sion of the water and sewer facilities
 to the new buildings being erected by
 Armstrong and Bruce on Mt. Pleasant
 was adopted.

The following report of the Com-
 mittee of the whole was adopted:
 "Your Committee report that under
 the provisions of the Housing Act ap-
 plication has been made for water and
 sewerage facilities to property pro-
 posed to be developed by the Local
 Housing Board and that under said
 Act it is essential that water and sewer-
 age be installed as far as practicable
 prior to or simultaneously with the
 building of houses and that no
 house be permitted to be occupied un-
 til provided with proper means of
 drainage and sewerage disposal and an
 adequate water supply."

"Your Committee therefore deeming
 it desirable to encourage the said
 Board in their efforts to pro-
 mote the erection of dwelling houses
 to relieve the congestion at present ex-
 isting would recommend that the Com-

missioner of water and sewerage be
 authorized to call for tenders for the
 necessary work according to plans and
 specifications to be prepared by the
 city engineer."

Margaret Connor wife of Charles
 Connor was granted a lease of Lot No.
 642, Brooks Ward, for 7 years at a
 rental of \$25 per annum.

The Commissioner of Finance re-
 ported payment of the following de-
 partmental accounts for the past
 month:

Water and sewerage \$5,471
 Public works 3,657
 Harbor, ferries, lands, 3,598
 Treasury 966
 Public safety 4,885

An amount of \$2,300 left over from
 the West Side ferry wharf was trans-
 ferred to the credit of the account for
 driving piles at the East Side ferry
 approaches.

The Mayor recommended that the
 order-in-council of Nov. 25, 1918, for
 the issue of debentures to the amount
 of \$1,980, bearing 6 per cent interest,
 be cancelled and annulled. Adopted.

James Huey was the only tenderer
 for painting the ferry boat and he was
 given the contract at \$74, being with
 in the estimate.

Some discussion took place on the
 advisability of putting a tax on elec-
 trical signs. Com. Thornton said they
 had to be watched, as the metal fast-
 enings were rusting away. The police
 were continually reporting the lights
 for being out, but there was no pen-
 alty.

Com. Bullock said the control of el-
 ectric signs should be under the Safe-
 ty Department.

The Mayor suggested a license fee
 of \$10 on electric signs.
 It was suggested that Commis-
 sioners Fisher and Bullock should make
 a report.

Com. Jones recommended the ac-
 ceptance of the tender of Moses, To-
 bias and Ferris for excavating a
 trench in Lancaster Street, West Side,
 for water and sewer facilities for the
 Housing Board's cottages; and this
 was adopted.

The tenderers were Moses, Tobias
 and Ferris, earth \$1,386, rock \$6,500;
 Ring and Irons, earth \$2,234, rock \$5,500;
 L. Stephens and T. Stephens, earth
 \$2,100, rock \$7,000.

Com. Jones was given permission to
 purchase pipes for water and sewerage
 on Lancaster Street; estimated cost
 about \$200.

CASE IN CHAMBERS.

The case of the Bank of Nova
 Scotia vs. H. H. Hatfield was taken up
 yesterday morning in Chambers before
 Mr. Justice Chandler. This is an ac-
 tion on a draft drawn by Edward
 Harrison, on the Hatfield & Scott Co.,
 Ltd., of Hartland, N. B., for \$298.85.
 The defendant, Herbert H. Hatfield,
 claiming that he was acting as agent
 of the Hatfield & Scott Co., Ltd., ac-
 cepted the draft on behalf of the com-
 pany. The draft was discounted and
 in the month of January last Hatfield
 & Co., Ltd., repudiated the authority
 of Herbert Hatfield to accept the
 draft. The defendant claims that he
 agreed to accept the draft, but that
 Mr. Roy, manager of the Bank of Nova
 Scotia, of Kentville, N. S., where the
 transaction took place, agreed that
 the draft would not be sent forward
 until a bill of lading for a carload of
 apples was attached to the draft. The
 defendant claims that the draft was
 sent forward to Hartland, N. B., with-
 out the bill of lading attached. Mr.
 Roy, manager of the Bank of Nova
 Scotia, Kentville, N. S., occupied the
 stand all morning. The case was re-
 sumed in the afternoon with the same
 witness on the stand, and was then
 adjourned until this morning at 10.30.

His Honor submitted two criminal
 cases to the grand jury, those of the
 King vs. Godsoe and the King vs.
 Roy Morrison.

Godsoe was charged with breaking
 and entering the drug store of Thom-
 as J. Durick and also of stealing. The
 grand jury found no bill on the first
 count, and a true bill on the second.
 G. Earle Logan is appearing for the
 accused.

In the case against Morrison, charged
 with stealing from the Eastern S.
 S. Company, a true bill was returned.
 J. M. Trueman appears for the prison-
 er.

This case will be tried on next Tues-
 day.

The remainder of the criminal dock-
 et was not submitted, as the accused
 persons elected to be tried by the
 Judge without a jury. Stanton and
 Smith are accused of stealing together.
 W. M. Ryan appears for Stanton and
 J. A. Barry for Smith.

Crawford and McMurray are jointly
 charged with stealing from Collins
 and Co. Both pleaded guilty and were
 remanded for sentence.
