The latest Welcome Home Reception took place in the C. H. C. Hall on Saturday evening, when the building was crowded to the entrance with an appreciative and thankful assemblage. There being among them a goodly representation from the neighboring communities. On this occasion the honored guests of the evening were: Signaller Murray E. Sharp, younger son of George H. Sharp of Lower Millstream, who was engaged in the teaching profession in the Canadian West, and hearing the call of his country early in the war, enlisted with a western battalion; Ptes. 
