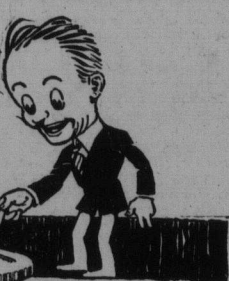

The latest Welcome Home Reception took place in the C. H. O. Hall on Saturday evening, when the building was crowded to the entrance with an appreciative and thankful assemblage. 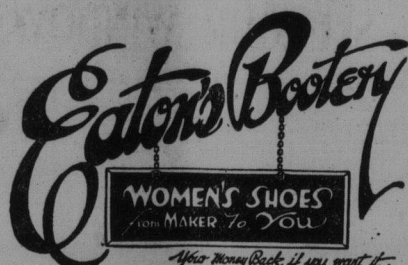
