Twenty Thousand Out.

As to unemployment the report says that of the unions who supplied figures, 55 per cent. of those affiliated with the council, reported 5,376 members unemployed. Some of the largest unions did not report and the executive finds the total number of unemployed in the sity and district of men, women and children is 20,000. Here again the report finds the causes of unemployment are "largely artificial."

Some Remedies Suggested.

Among remedies suggested are reduction of hours to six hours a day before reducing staffs and in any event the absolute application of the eighthour day, by beginning at once semi-productive enterprises such as house building, sewers, etc., the Dominion government to open and increase trade with foreign countries, and deflation of wind capital in over-capitalised concerns.

Big Decline In All

Cattle Trade for Year Only About Half What it Was Col. H. F. McLeod Is Year Ago.

Ottawa, Jan. 6.—According to fig-res furnished by the Dominion Live tock Commissioner, the exports of anadian cattle and sheep, during the leven months ended November 30. Canadian cattle and sheep, during the eleven months ended November 30, amounted to '281,567 cattle and 162,039 sheep, as compared with 485,786 cattle and 167,646 sheep during the same period in 1919. These figures show a decrease in shipments during 1920 of 204,219 cattle and on increase of 4,483 sheep. The value of the cattle shipments during the eleven months is estimated at \$22,053,861, as against \$44,644,146 in 1919. Sheep returned a revenue of \$1.651,488, as compared with \$1,859,886 during 1919.
