STILL STRONGER CASH POSITION  
REPORTED BY THE ROYAL BANK

Liquor Sleuths  
Made Raid On  
City of Hull

Fancy Clubs, Swell Cafes and "Blind Pigs" Were Treated Alike.

Ottawa, Dec. 20.—One hundred operatives of the Quebec Liquor Commission swooped down on the city of Hull this afternoon, raided a number of the so-called social clubs along the main thoroughfares, penetrated the maze of side streets comprising the older parts of the city, and in the form of a statement signed by H. Allan, president; J. E. Merrett, superintendent of branches and chief inspector; and J. G. Muir, chief constable, are "submitted to the new allocation and revaluation of certain assets which are now undergoing revision in view of the situation that has arisen."

Loans to the bank, exclusive of overdue debts, which total \$7,000,466, amount to \$119,723,673, made up as follows: call and short loans (not exceeding thirty days) payable in Canada, \$102,857,726; other current loans elsewhere than in Canada, \$1,017,807; loans to provincial governments, \$26,550; loans to cities, towns, municipalities and school districts, \$3,810,931. In addition to these, and not included in the above total, is the sum of \$472,850, being the aggregate of current loans to directors and firms of which they are directors.

Other assets of the bank include \$1,114,450 Dominion and Provincial Government securities; \$4,796,487 Canadian municipal securities; and British, foreign and colonial public securities other than Canadian; \$6,117,790 railways and other bonds, debentures and stocks; real estate other than bank premises, \$21,331; bank premises, \$4,607,749; and mortgages on real estate held by the bank, \$683,774.

The liabilities of the bank include \$58,087,635 savings deposits, and \$34,142 demand deposits payable in Canada. Deposits outside Canada total \$2,204,062. The sum of \$1,001,532 is due the Dominion Government, and \$2,871,458 due to other banks in Canada.

She has a regular speed of 17 knots and is an oil burner. She will be placed on the Liverpool-Canadian route.

## Shipping Record

For Montreal

Montreal, Dec. 21.—The shipping season of the Port of Montreal for 1921 was a record one, with a total of 807 trans-Atlantic steamers, having net tonnage of 2,598,494, and representing an increase of 169 vessels of 577,975 net tons over the 1920 total, and of 105 ships of 566,856 tons over that of 1919, which was the highest previous year.

The local harbor had the longest navigation season this year in all its history, opening March 29 and closing December 14.

The outstanding feature of the trade was the large number of full cargoes of grain carried in addition to the quantities on the regular liners, there being 63 ships fully loaded to the United Kingdom, and 233 to continental ports.
