a committee to meet Kentville Town Council to adjust and fix sums to be paid by Kentville town to this Municipality and vice versa in all matters between the two.

Resolved, that all claims against the township of Cornwallis for services in re School Lands suit and matters connected therewith, be left to the Councilors of Cornwallis as a committee to report to the Council.

Resolved, that 300 copies of pamphlet form of the Minutes of Council of January and April terms for 1890 be printed.

Report of supervisors on widening road near to and on lands of Perez M. Brecken and Geo. Brecken, near Canard street, was received, confirmed and adopted.

Resolved, that we pay for collecting rates this year 2 1/2 and 1 1/2 per cent, with the exception of Ward 14, 6, 11, 12, 10 and 7, which will be paid same as last year.

Resolved, that the committee to select site for necessary buildings for a central poor house and asylum for harmless insane, and agree to the amount to be paid for such site and sundry lands, and contract for the erection of such buildings thereon as may be necessary for the proper care of the paupers and harmless insane belonging to the County and to supply the same with such appliances and appurtenances as may be necessary for the suitable care of said paupers in same, be discharged from all further duties. Moved by W. E. Roscoe, seconded by J. P. Lyons.

Council adjourned till 18th inst.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 18TH.
Council met at 10 a. m. All the Councilors present.

Minutes of 17th read and approved. Resolved, to be added to schedule tolls on Gasperau and Black river the following words:

"And that the same tolls be sued for and collected by any one of the commissioners of the Gasperau and Black river, in his own name, before any justice of the peace for Kings County as a civil suit."

Whereas, the cost of maintaining the paupers in the poor house for the respective townships of the County in no case exceeds \$1.60 per week for each pauper inclusive of all expenses for salaries and labor, and in some of the townships is far less; and

Whereas, the cost of keeping persons confined in the county jail amounts to the sum of \$2.50 per week, besides other remunerations; and

Whereas, the care of the said jail requires but a small portion of the time of the keeper, who has the free use of the premises, which are of considerable annual value, and perquisites and fees connected with office of keeper; and

Whereas, a suitable keeper for the said jail can be procured and the necessary labor for the same provided, with no remuneration but the use of the jail buildings and premises, in which case the county would only be required to pay the actual cost of providing food and fuel necessary for persons confined therein; therefore

Resolved, that the pay of the keeper of the said jail not exceed the actual cost of the food and fuel necessary for the persons confined in the said jail, in addition to the use of the jail buildings and premises, with the perquisites belonging to the office of the keeper as now exceeding \$1.75 per week for prisoners. Moved by W. E. Roscoe, seconded by T. H. Morse.

On motion, the Council adjourned to meet again on Thursday, 25th inst.
