All the main buildings and wings are destroyed, and it is estimated that the loss will be over \$40,000. The children are being taken care of at the Roman Catholic Mission and by neighbors. The school was the largest in the Territories and situated in a pretty spot in Qu'Appelle Valley near the lake, and has always been a javorite place for visitors.
