ready to put it on your head，amidst an admiring throng of saints and ansels．But $I$ ，poor $I$ ，that have been waiting for my dissolution these nineteen years， mut be left behind to grovel here below．Well，this is thy confort，－it camo be long ere the chariots will be sent for worthess inc．If prayers can detain then， even you，reverend and very dear sir，shall unt lave us yet ；but if the decre has gone forth，that you mu：t now fall asteep in Jesus，may be hiss your soul away， and give you to die in the embraces of triumphant love．If in the land of the living，I hope to pay my respects to you next week．If not，reverend and very dear sir，f－a－r－x．w．e．t－le！My beart is too big ； tears trickle down too fast，－and I fear you arc too wenk for me to enlarge．May underneqth you be Chrit＇s evedasting arms：I commend you to his nẹ－ ver－failing merey；and am，very dear sir，jour most affectionate，sympathising，and aflicted younger bro－ ther in the Goapel of our common Lord，

Having collected twenty poor children，whom the designed to place in his orphan house，he saild on his fifth voyage for America in March，1754．The ship put into Lidton，where he remained several wacke While here tie hat an opportunity of witnessing se－ veral di．n が呩，exhibitions of ignorance and supersti－ tion．＇The foll＇uwing extracts from bis letters deseribe some of them：－
＂Nut long after iny arrival at my lodgings，I saw a company of pricsts and friars，bearing lighted war ta－ pers，and attended ly various sorts of people，some of whom had bate and baskets of vieturals in their liands，and others carried provi－ions on their shoul－ ders，or on sticks letween two．Alier these followed a mixed multisude，singing with a wry audible voice and addressing the Virgin Mary in their usual strain， Ora pro nobis！＇（Pray for us．）＂
T＇wo dhings occurred to make these disgusting pa－ geants more frequent at this time ；the season of Lent， and an excessive ilrought，which threatened the entire destruction of vegetation．
A secoml procession he describes as composed of ＂Carmelite friars，the parish priosts，and a great num－ ber oi lirothers of the order，who walked two ty two in different habits，holding long and very large lighted way tapers in their hatals．Amidst these was carried upon richt or ten men＇s shoulders，a tall image of the Virgin Mary in a hiad of man＇s attire．I think she had a rey tine white wig on her head，a dress she often appat in，an ：was much adorned with jewels and
 der a laren eamply ufobe，and supported ly eightor ten persols，came a priest，bobline in his hand some noted relic．Ater him followed several thousands of peoptr，joiang with the friars，and singing＇Ora pro nobis＇all the way
＂Still the raia was denied，and still the processina－ continued．At last the elouds began to gather，atid he mercury in the batometer fell very medh．There wa－ brought out a inowden maze，whith they say never failed．It was called＇The I．ord of the l＇assion．＇It was the figure of our blessed Lord，chothen in purple．
and crowned with thorns．Cpon his shoulders be bore a targe cross，under the weight of which he was repre－ scuted as stoopily，till hi，body was tent almost dou－ be．He was brought outfrom the Le Gras convent with very great pornp，and placed in a large cathedral charch．He was attended by many noblemen，and thou ambs of spectatirs，of all rambs and stations，who cronded fromevery quarter，and in their turn were admitet by the guards within the ruils to perform their derotions．This they did by kuncling and kiss－ ing the bect of the image，by putting their left and right eye to it，and then touching it with their beads． This scene was repeated fur three das succesively and during all this period the church was thronged with people．The third day in the forenoon it rain－ ed，and soon afer the image was conducted home in as great spleadour，and with greiter rejoicings than when it was brought forth．

He soon witee esed another cxhibition，of which he says：＂An intelligent Protestant whostood near me was my interjreter of the dumb show as it passed along．I say dumb show，for you must know that it was made up of waxen or woolen images，carried on men＇s shoulders through the strects，and designed to represent the life and death of St ．Francis，the found－ er of one of their religious orders．They were brought up from the Franciscan convent，and were preceded by three persons in scarlet habits，with baskets in their hands，in which they received the alms of the specta－ tors for the henefit of the poor prisoners．After these came two little boys in party－coloured clothes，with wings fixed on their shoulders in imitation of little an gets．Then apperared the image of St．Francis，very gay and beau－like，as he used to be before his conver－ sion．He was next introduced as under conviction and coneequently stripped of his fiacry．Soon after this was cahibited an image of our blessed Lord him－ self，in a purple gown，and long black hair，with St． Francis lying lefore him to reccive his immediate or－ ders．Then came the Virgin Mary with Christ her son at her left hand，and St．Francis making obeisance to both．Here be made his first appearance in his friar＇s habit，with his hair cut short，but not as yet shaved on the crown of his licad．After a little space followed a mitred cardinal eaudily atired，and before him lay St．Francis almest proitrate，in order to be contirmed in his oftice．Soon after this he appears Iuite metsmorphosed into a monk，his crown shorn， his habit llack，and his loins girt witio a knoted cord． Here he prays to our Sawoer haging on a cross，that the marks of the woumb in his hands，feet，and side， might be impressed on the sane parts of his body． The prayer is granted，blood comes from the hands， fect，and sitc，and the saint with great devotion re－ reves ibprraions．Upon this he berins to do won－ dirs，whl herefore in a litte while he is carried along as honting up a howe which was just falling．At toneth the holy father died，and is brought forth lying iat his grave．But lo！the triers and netties under which he hy are turncd into tine fragrant flowers． ．fier thi，he is borne along upon a bier covered with a silver pail，and four friars lamenting over him．He
