There is now no coal dealers' association in Brantford, as a result of it being smashed years ago in a High Court action. It is understood, however, that the dealers work together, and coal is at several times of the year such a scarce commodity that prices are made so as to command a fair profit. Coal prices are not any higher in Brantford than in any other city, but between the wholesalers and the retailers there is generally an understanding as to the retail price. This happy state of affairs, it is said, is liable to be upset this year in Brantford, and the consumers will benefit, although the dealer who threatens to make the break says it will result in a big loss to the trade.
