

HUNDREDS KILLED AND INJURED BY EARTHQUAKE AND ERUPTION OF MOUNT ETNA





The whole of the smiling countryside between Mount Etna and the Gulf of Catania, in Sicily, has been devastated by a terrible earthquake, which educed a dozen villages to ruins and caused a number of deaths, which the first official reports estimated at 139, with 350 injured. It is believed that a greater catastrophe was prevented by the fact that the final severe shock of earthquake had been preceded by sixty others
