



Diseases of Calves

Scours is the most common complaint of the young calf and is invariably caused by overfeeding though not infrequently by feeding sour or stale milk at varied temperatures. Prevention is in every case better than cure. On the first symptoms of the disease appearing the milk ration should be immediately reduced to half. If the trouble still gets worse give a drench of one to two ounces castor oil in a pint of milk. Care is necessary in bringing up to a full ration again, which must be done very gradually. A couple of raw eggs will also be found useful in checking the disease. The use of lime water, one part to three parts of milk, will often prove of benefit.
