LADY'S TWO GORED SKIRT.

The braid bound laps at the sides of this smart skirt are cut in one with the front gore and then turned back so that they hang loose. The belt is also cut in one at the top, and a belt comes around from the back and buttons onto the short front sections. The back gore is gathered at the slightly raised waistline. This model makes a very satisfactory skirt for general wear. It may be made up in serge, gabardine, shepherd check, twill or wool taffeta.

The lady's two gored skirt pattern No. 8734 is cut in five sizes—24 to 32 inches waist measure. Width at lower edge of skirt is 1 1/2 yards. The 26 inch size requires 3 yards, 30 inch, 2 1/2 yards, 44 inch, or 2 1/2 yards 1/4 inch material.

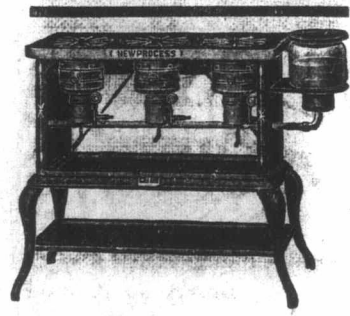
