Mr. Roosevelt is now President and has the good wishes of all men and we are greatly mistaken if he does not add glory to the presidency.

Since September Kitchener has put 685 Boers out of business composed of 67 killed 85 wounded, 384 made prisoners, and 163 surrendered, also 189 rifles and 65,211 rounds of ammunition; 3,400 horses and 19,000 heads of cattle.

On Saturday after the attempt on the life of President McKinley not less than 650,000 words were sent out in special despatches to newspapers by Buffalo correspondents, and as much more was sent from other points. Some 1700 operators were at work.

### HOW MURRAY BOASTS

The address of Premier Murray to the electorate has been published in his Halifax organ and it is now issued in pamphlet form and can be found in any of the Grit organizers office ready for promiscuous delivery. In it he says:

"During the last fiscal year the government appropriated for every branch of the public service larger sums than ever were expended for similar services in the history of the province."

Of this the Toronto Mail and Empire says:

"This is a great change. The new liberals are now actually boasting of their extravagance. One of these days we shall have politicians of this type openly bragging of the amount by which the taxpayers are fleeced."

The Halifax Herald adds:

"The worst feature of Mr. Murray's boast our contemporary fails to note, and that is its inaccuracy. He did not do what he states. He divided the largest revenue the province has had for a number of years, but for the great services of the province he did not give as much as had been given formerly when the revenue was little more than one half what it is to day. The services to which the large grants about which he boasts were such as interest on provincial debt, legislative expenses, salaries, etc. For such services very generous sums were voted, and will continue to be voted so long as we have the present crowd in power."

The electors who read and think will readily see that the people are not getting as much for the great and needy services of the province as we did 15 years ago. The money goes in such a way that it can be used for political purposes to induce constituencies to send liberal representatives. Look at our roads today. Every municipality in the province is calling out for more money to use on roads and the grant is being gradually reduced instead of increased. Any government can spend money even as poor a one as the present Nova Scotia government can take care of an immense provincial revenue in its own interests. But what is needed today is a government that will use the peoples money for the benefit of the people themselves and not to maintain themselves in power. Kings County needs more road money and even the Western Chronicle is compelled to affirm that our roads and bridges were never in such a condition before. Nineteen years of liberal rule is too long, what

we desire now is a change and a rule for the people and by the people.

### CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION

On Tuesday the Court House was well filled with delegates from different sections of the county and members of the Liberal Conservative party. President B. Webster occupied the chair and C. A. Tutis secretary read the list of delegates who proceeded to the Jury room to make selection of candidates. After some deliberation the delegates returned and announced that Messrs. P. Innes and J. W. Ryan had received a unanimous nomination from the delegates. This was greeted with cheers and on motion the nomination of these gentlemen was made unanimous to the convention.

Mr. Innes was absent in Halifax and Mr. Ryan was called upon and although taken by surprise in receiving a nomination he delivered an address which showed that he was thoroughly conversant with the public questions of this political campaign. He had not sought the nomination from the party and coming as it did he would require a few hours before giving his final decision. He stated however that there was sure to be a contest.

The convention was a most enthusiastic and harmonious one and with two such able men in the field the Conservatives felt that with strenuous efforts their candidates had a good chance of being elected.

Stirring speeches were made by Messrs Barclay Webster, Dr. H. Chipman and S. Baker.

We called attention last week to the fact that 19 years of rule had made the Liberals believe they owned the country and could do as they liked irrespective of the opinion of the mass of the people. Even in Kings this is apparent. The sentiment of the Liberal convention on Saturday was that the Conservatives or any one else had no right to bring out candidates in opposition to the ones they selected. The Conservatives always had the right to place men in the field and will continue so to do even though it is against the fiat of the leaders of the Liberal association. The reason that our opponents are so strenuously preaching "no opposition" is because they know full well their candidates are not as popular as formerly and they are doubtful of electing both men if a determined fight is made. There were more men at the Conservative convention on Tuesday who desired to see Messrs Innes and Ryan as candidates than there were at the Liberal convention on Saturday who desired the selection of the Liberal nominees.

Wolfville, Sept. 16.—Mrs. Annie Archibald, wife of Rev. E. N. Archibald, a well known Baptist pastor of this province, died at her residence on Highland avenue, Wolfville, Sunday Sept. 15th, after an illness of several months of most trouble. Mrs. Archibald was the daughter of Deacon Joseph Bradshaw, of Bede-que, P. E. I. Her life was intimately connected with educational interests, as her husband, her three brothers and her four children are all graduates of Acadia College. Her brothers are Rev. W. B. Bradshaw, pastor of the Baptist church at Medicine Hat, N. W. T.; Clarence W. Bradshaw, practising law at Winnipeg, and the Rev. F. J. Bradshaw, of the China Island Mission, now home on furlough. Her children are the Rev. William L., pastor of the Baptist church at Lawrencetown; Mabel E., for four years a devoted missionary at Chicacole, India; Rev. A. J., pastor at Glace Bay, and Rev. Arthur Archibald, late pastor at Hutchinson, Kansas, but who resigned in order to be with his mother during her last illness.

The deceased was a most estimable Christian lady, and will not only be missed by her immediate relatives, but by a large circle of sorrowing friends. The funeral took place at 3.30 on Tuesday.
