GOOD HARVEST IS LIKELY

**CONDITIONS ARE** 

**PRAIRIES' CROP** 

Cutting of Coarse Grains Well Under Way and Start Made on Wheat.

Winnipeg, Aug. 19.—Rains have been fairly general throughout the Prairie Provinces during the period covered by the 18th crop report is-sued yesterday by the Canadian Na-tional Railways for the week ending August 16. In consequence of the general precipitation, general im-provement in crop conditions is re-ported.

Cutting of rye and coarse grains is Cutting of rye and coarse grains is now well under way in Manitoba and parts of Saskatchewan, but the wheat harvest will not be general through-out the West until well towards the end of August. As high as 25 bushels of wheat is predicted in Manitoba and narts of Saskatchewan but the court of wheat is predicted in Manitoba and parts of Saskatchewan, but the south-ern reports in Alberta show that the average yield will be only eight bushels, with as much as 15 bushels in the best districts, and from eight to 20 bushels in the northern section. No damage from rust is reported to 20 bushels in the northern section. No damage from rust is reported for the week, very slight frost dam-age is Saskatchewan, where there is also a fly reported to be working in the Durum wheat in the Boundary sub-division, which has caused 25 per cent damage. Hail was reported by only two or three districts, and the greatest damage was 50 per cent. Altogether, prospects are much

Altogether, prospects are much brighter, and if the frost keeps off, considerably more grain will be har-

vested than was expected even in the previous report. Hailstorm in Assiniboia.

Hailstorm in Assinibola. Moose Jaw, Aug. 19.—The worst hail and rain storm experienced in many years swept over the Assini-bola district on Sunday afternoon. Hail drove over the town for more than half an hour, accompanied by torrents of rain that flooded cellars and streets causing considerable dom and streets, causing considerable damage to garden truck and flowers.


