Chinese Were Drowned Wholesale-A River Blocked with Their Corposes

London, November 44.—The Globe publishes a letter from a Belgian gentleman who has been travelling to Pekin, via the Transsiberian Railroad. He describes, under date of September 6, what he saw in the Amur River. His account surpasses in horror those previously published. The scenes I have witnessed during the three days since the steamer left Biagovetchensk, he says, "are horrible beyond the powers of describetion. It is the closing tableaux of a fearful human tragedy. Two thousand were deliberately downed at Moro, two thousand at Rabe and eight thousand around Biagovetchensk, a total of 12,000 corpses encumbering the river, among which were bodies of women and children.

List week a boat had to plough her way through a tangledernd mangled mass of corpses; laahed together by their long hair. The banks were literally covered with corpses. In the curves of the stream were dark, putrid, smelling masses of human flesh and bone, surging and swaying in the steamer's wake and wash. The captain, vainly ordered full speed ahead. The sight and smell will be ver with us. From Blagovetshensk to Aigum, 45 kilometers, numerous villages studded the bank, with a thriving, industrious population of over 100,000. An observer there said that he never saw snowflakes thicker in a storm than were the meteors in the sand were counted in one night at Boston. In 1866 there was a brilliant display, visible chiefly in Europeand Asia. The following year, however, the shower was seen in the United States. o complete their passage.
This stream of meteors, is many mil lions of miles long, and more than one hundred thousand miles thick. It takes the Leonids two years to pass the earth, although their velocity added to that of the earth, which is moving in an open site direction, is moving in an open site direction, in which is ing in an opposite direction, is more than one hundred and fifty thousand miles an hour.

In order to obtain a good view of the display on Wednesday and Thursday nights an unobstructed sight of the eastern skies must be obtained. These meteors radiate from the sickle These meteors radiate from the sickle-shaped group of stars in the constel-lation Leo. That constellation rises somewhat to the north of east, just before midnight. It will be useless to look for Leonids before that time, as all will be below the horizon.

The shower should last for five hours.

Leonids can be distinguished from other meteors from the fact that all of them will seem to start from the constellation Leo. They are of a greenish hue, with vivid, long trains.

Unfortunately the moon will be very near Leo during the nights of the probable shower. This will dim the brilliancy of the meteors, but, if the weather is good, and the astronnomers are correct in their calculations, a are correct in their calculations, close watch will be rewarded by sight of a rare event.
