WITH THE PREMIERS

Provincial Heads In Conference At the Capital.

THE SUBJECTS DISCUSSED

Increased Subsidies May Be Granted Upon Conditions - Provinces May Surrender Railway Jurisdiction-Ontario and Western Men Have Yet to Consider the Resolutions

of 1903-Sir Wilfrid's Welcome.

of 1903—Sir Wilfrid's Welcome.

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—In the Senate committee room, which has often been the scene of wrangles over railway charters, the Provincial Premiers and Ministers were in session for nearly three hours yesterday. The Premiers present were: Ontario, Whitney; Quebec, Gouin; Nova Scotla, Murray; New Brunswick, Tweedie; Prince Edward Island, Peters; Manitoba, Roblin; Saskatchewan, Scott; Alberta, Rutherford; British Columbia, MeBride.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in the morning, opened the proceedings with an address of welcome, to which each of the nine Provincial Premiers replied briefly. The federal representatives then spoke, and Premier Gouin of Quebec was made chairman of the provincial representatives' meeting, and Deputy Attorney-General Lauctot of Quebec was made secretary.

was made secretary.

After an hour's discussion in the morning the meeting was adjourned to give the representatives of the new provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan an opportunity to decide whether the resolutions of the Quebec confer-ence of 1902 would meet their views. Ontario's Position.

Beyond a request for increased subsidies, no clear understanding as to what will be brought up at the joint meeting yet exists. Premier Whitney said yesterday morning that he and 'is colleagues had come here at the request of the Dominion Government, but he did not bear what westing. but he did not know what questions would be submitted by the latter. The present Ontario Government, Mr. Whitney was understood to say, had not formally signified their concurrence. rence in the resolutions of 1903, except to this extent: that after the return to Toronto of former Premier Ross from the conference Mr. Whittay moved in the Legislature an amend-ment to the effect that Ontario's delegate had not put the case for that Province as strongly as he might have

Premier Gouin declared yesterday morning that Quebec's demands were contained in the printed resolutions laid before the Federal Government in laid before the Federal Government in 1903. He had no knowledge as to what other questions were to come forward. It is understood that until the Provinces have laid their demands before the representatives of the Dominion Government the latter will not announce the conditions upon which increased Federal aid will be vouch-safed. It seems to be taken for granted that the Dominion authorities will increase the subsidies to the Provinces, provided that suitable concessions in return are made by them.

Premier Peters of Prince Edward
Island, in the case of his province,
does not want the capitation allowance

does not want the capitation allowance based on the last census return, as the population of the island has declined. He wants a minimum fixed for the allowance, which a decrease in population will not affect.

The Premiers of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, while agreeing to the principle of the Quebec resolutions have just had a census taken of their provinces which shows a tremendous growth over 1901. They want the capitation allowance given on the

their provinces which shows a tremendous growth over 1991. They want the capitation allowance given on the basis of population shown by the 1906 and of any future census.

Committee to Revise.

A sub-committee consisting of Messrs. Gouin, Weir, Murray, McBride, Pugsley, Foy, Campbell and Secretary Lanctot was appointed to revise the Quebec resolutions. They will report to a meeting of the provincial representatives at 10 o'clock this morning. If the new draft of resolutions is adopted it will be presented to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the other federal Ministers to-day at 11 a.m.

It is believed that the Dominion Government is anxious to learn whether the Provinces are disposed to consider a proposition to surrender the right to subsidize railways, and, if so, upon what terms, and that they also wish to have a clearer idea as to the extent of jurisdiction when a Provincial line makes connection with a Dominion railway. If either of these matters comes forward, however, it must be with the consent of the Provinces.

Last evening the delegates attended a reception given by Sir Wilfrid Laurier. To-day at 1 o'clock they will be the guests of R. L. Borden at luncheon.

Bomb Hurled at General.

Sebastopol, Oct. 9.—A bomb was thrown yesterday at Major-Gen. Dumbadze, commander of the troops, as he was driving to the barracks of the Brest Regiment. The general, who was slightly wounded, fired on his assailant, but he escaped after a struggle with some soldiers. The general's coachman and two orderlies were severely wounded.

Confesses Infant Murder.

Port Huron, Mich., Oct. 9.—Bert and Mollie Kemp, aged 39 and 29, respectively, are under arrest here, charged with murdering their baby on Sept. 4. The police say that Kemp confessed the crime, saying that shame drove him to it.

Sentenced to Four Months.

Belleville, Oct. 9.—John Hines, who was yesterday morning found guilty of breaking into a G. T. R. bonded car and stealing therefrom, was sentenced to four months in the Central by Magistrate Flint.

Stop Paying Rent.
Smolensk, Russia, Oct. 9.—The peasants of Molkhin, at a great meeting held Sunday, resolved to cease paying rent to the proprietors of the land, and also adopted other resolutions of a most adical nature.

Leaves Deaf and Dumb Institute at retary of the I. O. F .- His Letter.

Toronto, Oct. 9.-Mr. R. Mathiso superintendent and principal of the In-stitution for the Deaf and Dumb at Belleville, personally handed in his re-signation to Hon Dr. Pyne, Minister of Education and acting Premier, whom he called upon at the Education De-partment yesterday morning.

He leaves the Government service to become Supreme Secretary of the In-dependent Order of Foresters, in suc-cession to Lieut.-Col. J. A. McGillivray, cession to Lieut.-Col. J. A. McGillivray, who is resigning on account of ill-heatth, not having been able to attend his duties during the last three or four months. The appointment was made at a meeting of the executive of the Foresters held at the Foresters' Island on Saturday. Mr. Mathison has been a Forester for 20 years, for 14 of which he was Supreme Journal Secretary.

The Letter of Resignation.
Mr. Mathison's letter to Hon. Dr

"Dear Sir.—After a service of thirty-four and one-half years, six years as Bursar of the Asylum at London, one and a half as Manager of Industries and Bursar of the Central Prison, Toronto, and 27 in my present position, I tender herewith my resignation as Superintendent and Principal of the Institution for the Dear and Dumb at Belleville, to take effect on Nov. 15, if convenient to you. Before leaving I wash to present the annual report to Sept. 30, and close up all matters of accounts, etc. I shall remain any longer period that you may think necessary "Dear Sir .- After a service of thirtyer period that you may think necessary in order to give my successor such in-formation as he may wish, and if at any time my experience is desired in furthering the interests of the deaf and dumb of this province it will be at your

"During my whole tenure of office I have been content to perform the various duties assigned me to the very best of my ability, and it is a pleasing recolection at the present time that I enjoyed the confidence of the Ministers and the various Governments under

"I notice by the newspapers that Mr. Snow of Toronto has been appointed by Royal Commission to enquire into matconnected with this institution Would you kindly arrange for Mr. Snow to commence his enquiries here in the near future, in order that his findings may be arrived at before I leave the

"Allow me to thank you personally for many courtesies since you have been head of this institution. I have received every consideration that you could possibly extend."

When Beaugrand retracted last month he told the archbishop he would strike out those clauses of the will, but this he failed to do, so the executors will give it effect to-day in its entirety.

The estate of the late mayor will foot up to nearly \$200,000, all of which will go to his daughter, Mrs. Vaillancourt, Madame Beaugrand having the use of it during her lifetime.
