ACCORD UPON MOROCCO

Keen Satisfaction Over Franco-. German Agreement.

Text of Accord Shows That There Are Advantages to Both Sides Although It Is In the Nature of a Compromise --- Conference Is to Be Held at Algeria If Spain Consents - To the Sultan.

Paris, Sept. 29.-The Franco-German accord upon Morocco, signed yester-day, arouses the keenest satisfaction, not only on account of Morocco, but chiefly because it terminates the suspense of months which threatened to disturb the peace of Europe. Both the Foreign Office and the German embas-sy were equally gratified to close the

ontroversy.

The accord is interpreted as a compromise in which each side secures advantages. Chancellor Von Buelow's proposition to submit Moroccan ques-tions to a conference is finally realized, and M. Rouvier has carried his point of keeping France's special interests from the conference and restricting the remaining questions within exact limits. The diplomats consider the re-sult highly advantageous in removing obstacles to a rapprochement between France and Germany.

The official text of the accord says:
"The negotiations between France and Germany on Morocco affairs has successfully terminated. Accord is reached upon a program comprising the organization of the police, the regula-tion and repression of contraband arms; financial reforms, consisting principally of the organization of a principally of the organization of a state bank and also the best means of collecting duties, and the creation of new means of revenue and also the termination of principles destined to safeguard the economic liberty of

Algeria For Conference.

The agreement then makes a special reservation of the frontier region between Algiers and Morecco, where the maintenance of police will be regulated directly between France and the Sultan without submission to the conference. The regulation of contraband in the same region also remains for France to determine with the Sultan.
The two Governments unite in asking that Spain accept Algeria as the

place for the conference place for the conference.

He said he would furnish copies of the entries referring to the transactions in question, but preferred not to bring the

"All rght," replied Mr. Perkins. Testifying to the purchase of \$4,000,000 of Cleveland, Cincinnati, Chi cago and St. Louis bonds from J. Morgan & Co. by the New York I Insurance Co., Mr. Perkins said t he obtained the bonds at \$40,000 le the obtained the bonds at \$40,000 less than the price stipulated by the life insurance company's finance committee. Questioned by Mr. Hughes, Mr. Perkins said that in this purchase and sale he himself represented both the New York Life Insurance Co. as purchaser and the sign of J. P. Morgan & Co. as seller.

Money Was Borrowed.

Testimony was given by Henry Regers Winthrop, financial manager of the Equitable Life Assurance Society to the effect that when the Navigation Syndicate, which turned out to be un-profitable, made calls for money on the George H. Squire trustee account for payment on account of syndicate participation, the money for the payments was obtained by borrowing \$250,000 from the Equitable Trust Co. Of this amount \$27,500 has been repaid. Mr. Winthrop said that in his opinion the papers advanced to the George H. money advanced to the George H. Squire trust account on this transaction was really the money of the Equitable Life Assurance Society.

The Ryan Purchase.

A statement showing the transfers of the stock of the Equitable Life Assur-ance Society, which accompanied the purchase of control of that society by Thomas F. Ryan was made by the society. It showed that 502 shares of the stock purchased by Mr. Ryan from James H.
